The Do The Right Thing Award Program has been part of the Rochester Police Department since 1995. The goal of the program is to foster positive relationships between local area law enforcement and the youth within Monroe County. The Do The Right Thing Award Program recognizes children for their positive behavior, accomplishments, and good deeds by rewarding students who strive to make good choices, do well in school, give back to their communities, or demonstrate "turn-around" or improved behavior. Any student enrolled in grades Kindergarten - 12 in any school within Monroe County is eligible for nomination, and can be nominated for acts of courage and bravery, such as assisting first responders, as well as acts of volunteerism, leadership and role model behavior. Students may be county.

Anyone over 18 years old can nominate a student (this includes first responders, teachers, coaches, family, friends, etc.). Nominations are accepted throughout the year, and are reviewed by a committee that selects students to receive the Do The Right Thing Award. Selected students are celebrated at a ceremony at the City Public Safety Building. Ceremonies are held during the school year, and family and friends are welcome to attend. All ceremonies are also recorded and shared on Facebook, so you'll never have to worry about missing a ceremony, and you can always go back and watch past recorded ceremonies as many times as you'd like!

Do The Right Thing Award winners are eligible to receive several rewards and prizes donated by program sponsors, and winners may also apply for a college or trade school scholarship when they are high school seniors. Since the program began, we have received over 4,000 nominations, awarded over 4,1100 winners, and contributed over \$100,000 towards scholarships for our winners. Students selected as winners must attend an award ceremony in order to officially be considered a Do The Right Thing winner, unless the ceremony is held virtually. All students that are nominated will receive a letter of recognition for their act, even if they are not chosen as a winner.

Each ceremony and the winners are highlighted in the media, courtesy of program sponsor News 10NBC WHEC-TV. Stories are televised on WHEC and highlighted on-line as well. Visit their website at WHEC.com to view past highlights.

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A Nicholas was nominated by West Webster Fire Chief Brian Kelly for his bravery and quick actions A during a fire emergency.

At approximately 3:00 a.m. on Saturday April 1st, the West Webster Fire Department was dispatched to the Fusilli home for the smell of something burning and visible smoke on the first floor. Fire crews arrived and were able to determine that the dishwasher had malfunctioned, resulting in plastic items inside melting and creating a smoke and fire hazard. The dishwasher power was isolated and the dishwasher made safe. When discussing the incident with the family, it was discovered that smoke alarms in the residence did not activate to alert the family, and that it was actually Nicholas who had awoken to the smell of smoke, identified the dangerous condition and immediately alerted his parents. His parents were then able to grab the safe outcome of this event, in both alerting his family to a dangerous condition, as well as limiting what could have been a larger fire event.



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AUSTIN GILLIS 12th Grade McQuaid Jesuit High School



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Austin was nominated by his mother, Kelly Gillis, for the work he did for his Eagle Scout service A project. Austin built a sensory garden for the Arc of Monroe.

The Arc of Monroe has been providing a variety of programs and services for over 1,400 people with intellectual and/or developmental disabilities and their families in the Rochester community for over 65 years. The Arc works to enhance the quality of life and self-esteem of people in their programs, providing them with meaningful social development, supported employment, residential community living and enrichment opportunities.

Austin's idea was to help people with intellectual and developmental disabilities have a safe place to rest, enjoy and stimulate their senses. A sensory garden is all about stimulating and engaging the five basic senses of sight, smell, sound, touch and taste. Spending time in a sensory

Austin spent a year planning his project, seeking ideas from The Arc employees, as well as the $\frac{1}{2}$ community. The large sensory garden was installed this past spring at the Arc of Monroe's $\frac{1}{2}$ Ballantyne Day Services location, and will be used for those supported by The Arc for daily $\frac{1}{2}$ activities.







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SHUAIB HUSSEIN 6th Grade **Roberto Clemente School #8 (RCSD)**



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☆ Shuaib was nominated by Arnett Branch Librarian Bruce Tehan for his outstanding work as an advocate ☆ for literacy, youth and libraries, as well as being an exceptional brother to his siblings.

Mr. Tehan said that Shuaib is a regular patron at the Arnett Branch Library, visiting almost daily with his brothers this past summer. Throughout the summer he was an enthusiastic participant in library $\overline{\mathcal{A}}$ 🖕 programs, and won numerous prizes for being one of the branch's best readers. His conduct in the 🖈 Flibrary was always gentlemanly, and he was a remarkably kind big brother to his siblings, constantly looking out for them and making sure they were safe and happy.

This summer Shuaib also emerged as one of the Branch's best volunteers. He took a keen interest in a 😓 the All Together, Kids' Summer Reading Program. This program is designed to encourage literacy, library 🖈 $^{\intercal}$ use, and general education in a fun and entertaining way. Mr. Tehan observed Shuaib, on his own, tell many kids about the program, and encouraged them to join. Shuaib's actions were directly responsible for approximately twenty percent of the program's enrollment.

🔄 One noteworthy incident Shuaib was involved with occurred on an afternoon when there were a lot of 😒 kids in the building with no planned activities. Shuaib approached Mr. Tehan and suggested that something be done. When asked if he could think of something for the kids to do that would be fun and ywould teach them something about the library, Shuaib came up with the idea of a library themed 🕁 🖈 scavenger hunt. Mr. Tehan asked Shuaib to plan and run this activity, and Shuaib met this challenge 😒 brilliantly. He scattered images throughout the library so that kids could learn about the various $\frac{1}{2}$ collections and services the library provided, and then supplied each of the kids with a list of things they $\frac{1}{2}$ st needed to hunt for. If they got stumped during the hunt, he provided clever hints to help them on their stway, and at the end of the event, he passed out prizes supplied by the library. Shuaib's program was so well crafted and received that it was repeated two more times this summer!





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MATTHEW KLINKBEIL 8th Grade John Williams School #5 (RCSD)



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A Matthew was nominated by his mother, Terry Sinopoli Klinkbeil, for his ability to remain calm a dangerous situation.

One day while Matthew was at his great-grandmother's (he calls her Nana) house after school, the kitchen started filling with smoke. Nana had accidentally left food in the oven when she way went to pick up Matthew's sister from softball practice. Matthew called his Nana and let her way what was going on, and she gave instructions over the phone to help Matthew turn off way the oven and safely remove the food.

A Matthew is a very high functioning person with autism, but a large number of instructions can A A easily confuse him. Yet during this incident, he was able to remain calm and follow everything his Nana told him, keeping himself, his elderly aunt who was with him, and the house safe!





Grayson was nominated last year by substitute teacher Debbie Deuschle for the kindness and compassion he displayed towards another student.

Durand Eastman Primary (East Irondequoit CSD)

In second grade, Grayson was in a General Education program at Ivan Green Elementary School, and his class was combined with a Special Education class. One day in May, Ms. Deuschle was working with both groups in a Physical Education class. During this class, she observed Grayson help a special needs student learn to play basketball. She says Grayson was not promoted to help, and showed so much compassion to this classmate that it truly touched her heart. Mrs. Deuschle said Grayson has a heart of gold and she will never forget what he did!

His teacher last year, Grace Di Maria, said that Grayson has a kind heart, and accepts others for exactly as they are. She said he comes to school every day with a smile and ready for whatever the day has to bring. She went on to say he is very kind and thoughtful, and has a way of making others feel special. He would often bring her little gifts delivered with a big smile, and his mother says that Grayson insists on bringing school staf<u>f members, as well as his friends, small gifts each week.</u>



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MADELINE SCAHILL 11th Grade Bishop Kearney High School



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Madeline was nominated by School Administrator Keith Miller for being an outstanding, wellrounded, role model student who always seems to do the right thing, even when no one is looking. Madeline is an individual that shows kindness and caring to all, always making sure to include everyone, and goes out of her way to ensure that everyone is treated with dignity. Madeline is involved in many school activities. She leads the Best Buddies program, which helps build one-to-one friendships between people with and without intellectual and developmental disabilities, offering social interactions while improving the quality of life and level of inclusion for a population that is often isolated and excluded. She is a Global Ambassador, a position that assists the foreign exchange students that attend the school, and she is also involved with the Art and Drama group, where she has participated in several of the school's theatre productions. All of this while maintaining an overall GPA of 96.7%. Over the summer, she worked as a lifeguard at Seabreeze Amusement Park.



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NYLA SERRET **Pre-Kindergarten Rochester Early Childhood Center (RCSD)**



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ኛ Nyla was nominated by 911 Telecommunicator Kathleen Burns for her quick thinking and 🎘 bravery. Back in July, Ms. Burns took a 911 call from a very young child requesting help for her 💑 stmom. The child said that her mom cut herself and needed a doctor. Later in the call, she said stthat her mom needed a band aid, but they didn't have any. The call disconnected during the 😓 brief interview, so Ms. Burns was only able to obtain very minimal information from the child. She did hear her say she was four years old, but never even had a chance to get the child's name. Fire dispatch was eventually able to speak to the mother on the phone to confirm that she was $\frac{1}{2}$ ok, and police also responded to the location to confirm everyone was ok. Nyla's mom had a minor cut on her hand that she accidentally did while cooking. Ms. Burns was so impressed that 🖈 Nyla knew at such a young age to call 911 if she needed help, and nominated Nyla so that her 🖈 bravery would be recognized.





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KWYNN WALTON, JR. 2nd Grade Nathaniel Hawthorne School #25 (RCSD)



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Kwynn was nominated by School Administrator Denise Quamina for his quick thinking during an emergency situation that took place during school last April while Kwynn was in first grade.

One day in the middle of lunch, one of Kwynn's classmates began choking. Kwynn ran across the 🖈 cafeteria to get the parent liaison, Ms. Montalvo's, attention. He told her that his friend needed 🖈 ^{*}help because he was choking. Without hesitation, Ms. Montalvo accompanied Kwynn to the choking victim, where she firmly hit him on his upper back, causing the chip that was lodged in 🖕 the student's throat to dislodge.

🕁 Kwynn's actions of quickly seeking adult assistance on this day helped save his classmate's life, 🖈 *and everyone at School #25 is so proud of him!

Last May, Aubrey came home from school to find her mother unconscious. Aubrey was able to contact 911 through her mother's personal emergency response system on her medical alert button. With the operator's guidance over the phone, Aubrey gave her mom CPR until the contact ambulance arrived.

Ms. Davis said the last thing she remembered was that her blood glucose level was very low so $\frac{1}{\sqrt{2}}$ she went to get some juice, and the next thing she knew she was waking up in the hospital. It was there she learned what her daughter did for her.

AMs. Davis is so proud of her daughter for saving her life! She says Aubrey is an amazing daughter A who always helps around the house with things like cooking and cleaning. Her teacher, Kim Roberts, said Aubrey is an exceptional young lady who is kind to everyone, always willing to help, and who loves to make everyone smile!

It's that time of year again! Do The Right Thing Award Program is conducting our annual holiday toy drive to help support the Pirate Toy Fund.


