- ** **“DO THE RIGHT THING”** was instituted to reward children for their positive accomplishments and to enhance the lives of many of our city’s needy youth.

- ** **“DO THE RIGHT THING”** Award program was established, with students selected monthly for recognition by the police department for their outstanding accomplishments.

- ** On October 7, 1995 the Rochester Police Department received permission to start the Rochester Chapter of **“DO THE RIGHT THING”**.

- ** The goals of the program are to:
 - Reinforce socially desirable behavior among youth in the community.
 - Demonstrate that “good kids” are news worthy.
 - Foster positive relations between the police and kids by building bridges of trust, understanding and civic responsibility.

- ** **“DO THE RIGHT THING”** will continue to build a sense of mutual respect and understanding between young people and police officers by initiating new projects and activities to stimulate the relationship.

- ** **“DO THE RIGHT THING”** and programs like it are only the first step.....The future for today’s children is what we make of it.

Jayanna Arnold

4th Grade

Virgil I. Grissom School #7

Mary Farrell, Jayanna's grandmother, nominated Jayanna. Jayanna was nominated for her fast response in an emergency situation. While in her back yard Jayanna was approached by a two-year old who informed her that a one-year old boy had fallen into a nearby swimming pool. Jayanna did not hesitate to jump over the fence to go to the child's rescue. Jayanna was able to drag the one-year old child out of the pool and brought him safely to an adult. Jayanna's actions prevented a tragedy and saved a life.

The male bicyclist's arm was cut deeply and bleeding profusely, his leg was broken, and he had serious abrasions on his other leg. Rachel turned a potentially stressful situation into a calm, organized event by taking charge, rendering first aid, and remaining cool.

Brent Ricci

5th Grade

Victor Central School

Tammy King is Brent's cousin and the person who nominated Brent. Brent was with his father and sister when his dad was working on land that he owned. While burning brushwood, Brent's dad's arm caught fire. Brent dialed 9-1-1 and wrapped a sweatshirt around his dad's arm. Brent consoled his little sister and called his mom. Brent at 9-years old was level headed and kept his calm in an emergency situation.

October 2006

Sean Pogue, Assistant Principal, nominated Preston, Mykel, and Kevin. Preston, Mykel, and Kevin's attention was drawn to the direction of a young woman who was in distress. The female was also a student at East High School and was returning to school to participate in an after school activity. As she walked along East Main St. she became aware of a man walking just behind her. The female was waiting at the corner for the light to change when the man walked up on her from behind, reached around her, and proceeded to touch her inappropriately. She broke free, ran across the street towards the three male students and called out for help. With out hesitation the young men took charge by scaring the man away and escorted the female student back to East High School. The young men were able to give a general description that resulted in the male being picked up within 10 minutes. These young men stepped up to stamp out violence on our city streets by assisting someone in need. As a result of their quick actions a predator was taken into custody and a young girl escaped harms way.

Mahogany Harris **7th Grade** **Lincoln Park School #44**

Michele Terrill, a telecommunicator from the 9-1-1 center, nominated Mahogany. A call to 9-1-1 originally began with a hysterical, female adult screaming that people were "cutting each other." The 9-1-1 operator called the house back for further information. Mahogany answered the telephone and calmly and clearly gave the 9-1-1 operator the information that the emergency responders needed. Mahogany stayed on the telephone and gave the 9-1-1 operator updates in a polite, clear, and calm manner. In the words of the 9-1-1 operator, "Mahogany was one of this operator's politest callers I've had in almost 9 years on the job." Due to Mahogany's ability to stay focused and under a stressful situation, the emergency responders were equipped with the information they needed to aid the victim.

November 2006

Saron Berhe

7th Grade

Webster Christian Academy

Karen Miller, a 911 operator, nominated Saron for her quick thinking during a fire. Saron and her family were in their apartment in a high rise apartment building when they smelled smoke and heard the fire alarm. Saron and her family attempted to leave their apartment, but when they opened the door to the hallway, the hall was filled with smoke. Saron shut the door and put a wet towel under the door to help prevent the smoke from coming in. Due to Saron's quick thinking she and her family were able to be rescued unharmed.

Virginia Goodwine

8th Grade

Twelve-Corner Middle School

Gloria Goodwine, Virginia's mother, nominated her for notifying the principle that a fellow student had a knife at school. Virginia was in the lunchroom at school when she noticed that another student had a knife in their purse. As Virginia proceeded to tell an adult about it several students verbally harassed her and attempted to stop her from telling on the student. Virginia knew that she needed to inform an adult about the knife and told the principal. The other student was suspended for possessing the knife. Virginia's desire to do the right thing may have prevented someone from being hurt.

Carol Beairsto, Kenneth's teacher, nominated Kenneth for seeing and reporting a weapon to his teacher. Several students including Kenneth saw the weapon at school, but Kenneth was the only student that was courageous enough to come forward and tell his teacher about the weapon. School personnel were able to locate the weapon and remove it.

6th Grade

Henry W. Longfellow School #36

Michelle Sutton, Trevon's teacher, nominated him for turning in drugs that he found. Trevon was walking into school when he found a baggie containing what he thought to be drugs on school grounds. Trevon picked up the baggie, brought it into the school, and gave it to an adult. Trevon's actions kept other children from harm's way.

Kathy Phelan, Hunter's Grandmother, nominated him for his quick and calm thinking when she fell while watching Hunter and his two-year old sister, Aggie. When Ms. Phelan fell and became disoriented Hunter told his two-year-old sister to stay with her while he went downstairs and called his mother at work to let her know what happened. Hunter calmly answered his mother's questions about his grandmother's condition as he made his way back to his grandmother's side. Hunter's quick thinking at five-years-old helped keep a stressful situation calm for everyone.

December 2006

11th Grade

Aquinas Institute

Mayor Robert Duffy nominated Kate after receiving a letter from Kate's father, Tom DeRoller. Kate spent her summer vacation training for the Multiple Sclerosis (MS) Bike Tour after deciding that she wanted to participate in this year's 75-mile fundraiser. While working almost full time over the summer Kate was able to train for the race and obtain pledges. Kate submitted 100% of her pledges the day of the race. Kate was presented with many challenges but did not waver from her goal. Kate, a first time rider faced the challenges of the rain, the hills, the (borrowed) bike, and the 75-mile ride. In the words of Kate's father, "her spirit and determination reflect the philosophy of the MS society."

Brenda Northcutt is a teacher at Tom's school. Ms. Northcutt nominated Tom for acting quickly and calmly during a serious accident. Tom along with other students was on a school bus going to school when they were involved in a head on crash on Spencerport Road. He also assisted in directing the bus driver as the driver called the Greece School base to notify them of the accident. Tom's ability to stay calm and provide assistance in a stressful situation helped a bad situation from becoming worse.

Lorraine Henderson, Michael's mother, nominated him for his honesty. Michael went to Citizen's Bank to cash his check. While he was having dinner Michael discovered that the teller had given him \$20.00 dollars more than she should have. Michael asked his mom to return the money to the bank as he discovered the error after the bank had closed. Michael's truthfulness prevented a teller from coming up short and possibly saved the teller from disciplinary actions.

4th Grade

Flower City School #54

Shayla Shuler, a 911 telecommunicator, nominated Michael for his ability to provide information during a medical emergency in a clear and concise manner. Michael called for an ambulance when his mother had passed out on the floor. Mike was able to remain calm and give all of the pertinent information needed for his mother to receive proper care. Michael's calm and collect manner during an emergency situation helped his mother to obtain the help that she needed.

Longfellow School #6

Gladys Vasciannie is Theresa's Vice-Principal and the person who nominated Theresa. After hearing talk about a student with a gun in his book bag Theresa fearlessly reported it to her teacher. Theresa made the right decision and spoke to an adult about what she knew. Although it was later determined that the gun was a pellet gun Theresa showed great courage because she thought the gun was real.

Aimee Hueym, Max's Physical Education teacher, nominated Max because of his compassion for others. Max bakes and sells dog treats and gives the money to the Heifer Animal Foundation. Max also grew his hair out so that he could donate it to the "Locks of Love" program. Max was able to donate 13 inches of hair so that someone else will be able to benefit. Max's desire to help others shows through these examples of unselfishness and kindness.

Nick's mom, Rae Maenza, nominated Nick for saving a life. Nick was with his family at Stony Brook Park and swimming in an area that had a waterfall. Nick's aunt noticed that her five (5) year old son; Damian was struggling in the water. Without hesitation Nick jumped into the water and was able to bring Damian to shore. Nick's quick reaction without doubt prevented Damian from drowning as the force of the waterfall was pulling Damien under the water.

On December 14, 2006, while walking to school, Tyrell noticed that his next-door neighbor's house had smoke coming out of it. Tyrell immediately turned around, went back home, and told his father. Due to Tyrell's quick thinking the fire department was able to respond to the fire quickly and no one was hurt.

Joseph Holleran is the Principal at Harrison's school. Mr. Holleran nominated Harrison for helping his neighbor. Harrison was walking with his sister when he noticed that his neighbor was on the floor of his garage. Harrison yelled to his mother, "That man needs help." The neighbor, Art Masters, an elderly male had fallen and lain for 3 ½ hours. Harrison's mom called 911 and Harrison supplied the house number. Mr. Masters sustained a fractured hip and it was reported that Mr. Master's temperature had fallen to 91 degrees. Harrison's attention to his surroundings very likely helped to save Mr. Masters' life.

Nicholas Piano 10th Grade Brockport Central-Oliver Middle School

Nicholas' hockey coaches nominated him for this award for his honesty, dedication and ability to lead by example. It was noted that Nicholas has exhibited a series of behavior's that are worthy of consideration of this award. However, the event that will be highlighted is a life saving incident. This past summer Nicholas was at a neighbor's house on the poolside deck. While on the deck a 3-year-old boy jumped into the pool and began to go under the water. Nicholas was able to get to the poolside and lift the boy from the water to safety. Due to Nicholas' ability to remain calm in a stressful situation the young boy was unharmed.

Theresa Perkins, a telecommunicator from 9-1-1 center, nominated Kiera for being levelheaded during a crisis. Kiera called 9-1-1 because her mom was having a seizure. While on the phone Kiera's mom started to go into a second seizure. Kiera stayed very calm and responded to all question and followed all of the instructions the 9-1-1 operator gave her. Kiera's composure during an emergency helped to keep her mom safe until the emergency personnel were able to respond.

June 2007

Leslie Thurman 9th Grade Fredrick Douglass Preparatory School

Captain Kevin Costello of the Rochester Police Department nominated Leslie for her courage during difficult circumstances. On March 21, 2007 Leslie was a victim of a dog bite. While walking home from school a very large Rotweiller charged Leslie and bit her. She fled to a neighborhood porch where the dog followed her and continued to attack her. While on the porch Leslie grabbed the collar and rear neck skin of the dog and physically restrained it, preventing it from continuing to bite her. Neighbors responded to help as she continued to hold the large dog that continued to bite her and try to break free. Her actions, performed while injured (sustained bites to her leg, forearm and hand), prevented the dog from breaking free and injuring others in the area. This dog ultimately attempted to bite its owner and had to be shot when it broke free and charged the police officers.

James Eckelberger 4th Grade Andrew J. Townson School #39

Mrs. Beverly Eckelberger is James' grandmother and the one who nominated him for his response in an emergency situation. James was with his grandmother when she went into a diabetic coma. James called his mother and she directed him to call out to his grandmother and to try to wake her up, but she was too far-gone. James' grandmother attributes his actions and his being levelheaded to her being here today.

Daesha Lumpkins 5th Grade Henry Lomb School #20

Ms. Greta Davis, the school social worker, nominated Daesha for exhibiting courage. Ms. Coleman, Daesha's mother experienced a prolong illness that resulted in her becoming incapacitated for an extended period of time. As she struggled to regain her strength, Daesha stepped in to provide vital support for her family. Daesha assisted with household duties, which included caring for both her mother and her severely handicapped sister. Ms. Coleman stated that during time of despair and profound sadness; Daesha would often encourage her with a kind word, a prayer, or a song. Daesha was able to maintain her family crisis and still managed to keep up with her schoolwork. Daesha showed a tremendous display of character and responsibility when faced with her mother's illness.

Brian Dunn 3rd Grade George Mather Forbes School #4

Melvin Martinez 2nd Grade John Walton Spencer School #16

Mr. Bruce Dunn, Brian and Melvin's grandfather, nominated them for selflessly providing a community service. Brian and Melvin are cousins, and decided to have a "clean sweep" of their own. One Saturday morning they commissioned themselves to cleaning the sidewalks and yards from Anthony Street to Post Avenue. Their hard work made a difference to the appearance of the neighborhood.
