Consolidated Plan

- Documents community needs
 - Input from City departments, community organizations, businesses and citizens
 - Community Survey
 - Maps and Statistics
- Guides Rochester's use of Federal grant allocated through HUD's formula grant programs
- Sets priorities over next five years
- Allocates funds to specific programs during 2015-16

Consolidated Plan Contents

- Assessment of Housing and Homeless Needs
- Analysis of Housing Market
- 5-Year Strategic Plan
 - Identify general priority levels and projected funding levels for each of the eligible activities
- 1-Year Action Plan
 - Allocates funds to specific projects and programs

FEDERAL PROGRAMS

- **CDBG** Community Development Block Grant
- **HOME** HOME Investment Partnership
- HOPWA Housing Opportunities for Persons with HIV/AIDS
- **ESG** Emergency Solutions Grant

Community Development Block Grant (CDBG)

- Funds allocated by formula
- Annual grants can be used to
 - Revitalize neighborhoods,
 - Expand affordable housing
 - Create or retain jobs
 - Improve community facilities and services
- Projects must principally to benefit low- and moderate-income persons
 - Individuals earning less than \$37,550 annually
 - A family of four earning less than \$53,600 annually (Source: Rochester MSA Income Limits, HUD)

CDBG Eligible Activities (examples)

- Housing
 - Housing Rehabilitation
 - Code Enforcement
 - Homeownership Assistance
- Economic Development
 - Assistance to businesses
 - Microenterprise Assistance
- Infrastructure streets, roads, sidewalks, etc.
- Public Facilities and Improvements
- Public Services Youth, Seniors
- Accessibility improvements
- Lead-Based Paint Abatement
- Planning and Capacity Building
- Program Administration

Home Investment Partnership Program (HOME)

- Designed exclusively to create affordable housing for low-income households.
- Awarded annually as formula grants

HOME Eligible Activities

- Homeowner Rehabilitation
- Homebuyer Activities
- Rental Housing
- Tenant-Based Rental Assistance

Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS (HOPWA)

- Housing assistance and related supportive services for low-income persons with HIV/AIDS and their families
- Grants provided by formula allocations to States and metropolitan areas with the largest number of cases and incidences of AIDS.

Emergency Solution Grants (ESG)

- Formerly called "Emergency Shelter Grant"
- Rehabilitation or conversion of buildings into homeless shelters.
- Funds certain related social services, operating expenses, homeless prevention activities, and administrative costs.
- Allocated annually based on the formula used for the Community Development Block Grant

CITY OF ROCHESTER SNAPSHOT

• 27% of households within the City of Rochester are severely "cost burdened"; more than 1 in 4 working families spend more than 50% of their income on housing and utilities.

- During 2013-14, approximately 3,369 persons received services relating to being homeless or in need of transitional or supportive housing in the City. (Source: Rochester ESG Year-End Report)
- The Rochester Housing Authority manages 2,332 units of public housing and 4,746 families are on the waiting list.

• The Rochester Housing Authority administers 8,816 Housing Choice (Section 8) Vouchers and has a waitlist of 12,517.

39.3% are owner-occupied and 60.7% are renter-occupied

Vacancy Rates

1.7% in owner-occupied units and 7.2% in renter-occupied units

- Median home value of owner-occupied units is \$75,800
- Median home value of owner-occupied units in NY is \$136,000
- 29.9% of owners considered to be cost-burdened
- 59.0% of renters considered to be cost-burdened
