Pathways to Peace turns 20

For two decades, Pathways to Peace has been engaging youth on the streets and helping them find alternatives to gangs, drugs and violence.

The street outreach program celebrates 20 years of service this year. It was started by former Mayor Bill Johnson back in 1998 to protect youth at risk and help them get on track to a better life. Since then, the program has had many success stories, with participants who've gone on to serve in the military, get good jobs or enroll in college. The Pathways team works to pair youth with whatever services each one needs in the wider community.

Referrals can be made by law enforcement, neighbors, family or friends, community agencies or even by the youth themselves. You can learn more online or from the Pathways to Peace office at 200 West Ave.



Meet Deputy Chief La'Ron Singletary

Building a strong and trusting relationship with the Rochester community is the number one goal for 38-year-old Rochester native, Deputy Chief La'Ron Singletary.

In his 18th year of police work, Singletary will be directing the Rochester Police Department's new Community Affairs Bureau. He says that the new bureau, with 40 officers including crime prevention officers, school resource officers, a recruiter and a public information officer, will increase police engagement with the community and build a sense of trust.

One step to building trust is educating the public on what the RPD is working toward in the community. For example, the RPD hosts a police training advisory council where residents can learn about policies

and procedures while also providing input to the department. The RPD also engages with youth in the community through the Police

Explorer Program and internships for college students interested in criminal justice and related fields.

Input from residents has shown Singletary and the rest of the RPD that this bureau is needed, and initial feedback has been positive.

Through the new bureau, officers will have more opportunities to get to know the people they protect while residents can interact with the police in a

positive way outside of crisis situations.

Singletary is excited about leading the new Community Affairs Bureau and believes that focusing on better police-community relationships will make Rochester a stronger and safer city.



Building Wealth and ROC'ing the Economy

Launched earlier this year, The Mayor's Office of Community Wealth Building was created to help city residents build personal wealth and achieve equal pay for equal work.

The Office will serve as a one-stop-shop for entrepreneurs and small business owners seeking information on how start or sustain a business. One of the goals for 2018 is to help entrepreneurs and small businesses get better access to credit which would allow those businesses to create jobs and boost the city's overall economy.

The Office of Community Wealth Building is loosely modeled after a similar initiative in Richmond, Virginia and will handle programs and policies around financial literacy, wealth building and wage disparity. "This internship is helping me to understand IT in a professional environment, as you can only go so far in the classroom," says Jacob Rivera, from Alfred State University. He is helping to maintain the City's databases and tracking work orders as part of his internship.
