

Clean Sweep Returns May 11, 2019



When the snow melts in the spring, you know the time is coming for Clean Sweep.

Last year, Clean Sweep 2018 was a huge success! More than 3,000 people and members of the Rochester Red Wings showed up to get our city cleaner, greener and ready for spring!

Since it was first launched in 2006. more than 30,000 volunteers have participated in Clean Sweep, working alongside City crews to remove winter debris and litter from city neighborhoods. Volunteers

also plant flowers, prune trees and perform other neighborhood beautification projects. City crews remove graffiti, clean

City-owned properties, repair sidewalks and fill potholes.

Black Heritage Month

The City of Rochester's Black Heritage Committee is busy planning activities to highlight and commemorate the African American experience in our community and our country.

This year's theme is "Black Migration: Arising from Poverty and Ascending into Destiny" and will center on the movement of African Americans from the South to Rochester and other parts of the country.

Most of the month's activities are free and include several gospel concerts, activities for youth, art and jazz along with a food tasting. From Cold War Intrigue to Job Creator: the Kodak Hawkeye Plant




Northeast Rochester is getting an economic boost and new jobs thanks to the renovation and repurposing of the old Kodak Hawkeye plant off St. Paul Street.

The new owners of the roughly 785,000 square-foot campus, once a source of Cold War intrigue, have started with the rehabilitation of Building 5 to create what's called a Foreign Trade Zone. In addition, they're planning offices and a center for e-commerce and startups. In 2020, they plan to add construction of affordable housing.

The project is expected to create 100 permanent full-time jobs, 100 construction jobs

and 100 affordable apartments within the next few years. The owners, WBS Capital Inc., have committed to working together with women and minority-owned companies in the area to bring this project to successful completion. They also plan to hire from the local community and from returning veterans and their families.

Already the excitement about this revitalization has led to inquiries from other developers interested in parcels nearby - positioning the St. Paul corridor and the Northeast section of the city for a long overdue rebirth!



Clear the Snow So All Can Go



The City of Rochester employs some of the best snow fighters in the business, but when the flakes start falling, keeping our families safe and our roads open is everyone's responsibility.

During severe weather, listen to local radio and television stations for updates on important snow plowing and parking instructions. You can also find information on the City of Rochester's Facebook and Twitter

You can track snow plows in real time through our PlowTrax application, www.cityofrochester.gov/plowtrax. To accommodate street snow plowing, strictly observe alternate side parking regulations.

The City plows sidewalks when four inches or more of new snow has accumulated. The

rest of the time it is the home or business owner's responsibility. Just one inch of snow on the sidewalks can prevent residents with disabilities from getting to work or elsewhere, so please, clear the snow so all


