

# **Keeping Rochester Housing Affordable**

This fall, we're celebrating more than 500 apartments that have been upgraded while still being preserved as affordable housing.

This includes Southeast Towers in the heart of what is now one of Rochester's hottest real estate markets: Downtown. The residents there will benefit from \$118 million in renovations, thanks to the new owners, Conifer Realty, with major contributions from the state and the City of Rochester allowing for investments in new water, sewer and electrical systems as well as energy efficient windows, appliances and lighting.

With 336 units, Southeast Towers offer almost one third of all the affordable housing units in Downtown and it was critical that these homes stayed affordable so that longtime Downtown residents are not displaced.

This fall, we also celebrated a \$15 million investment in the former Southview Towers, now known as the E.L. Tower after Elliot Landsman. Though he died in 2013, his repu-

tation as a respected and ethical businessman lives on. Thanks to Landsman Development, the tenants now enjoy new roofs, windows, doors, plumbing, elevators, flooring, kitchens, baths, lighting and landscaping. This 17-story building is home to more than 193 apartments. So to all our residents at Southeast Towers and the E.L. Tower, welcome home!

#### The Rochester Traffic Violations Agency Exceeds Expectations a ticket in the city meant you had to deal directly with the state. But after working with our lawmakers, we were able to open our own RTVA and make it easier for motorists to deal with their traffic tickets locally. Over the last fiscal year, RTVA reports that the majority of motorists chose to address their

tickets in person and nearly 90 percent who

qualified for reduced fines, accepted them.

And now, at 200 East Main St., Rochester drivers also have our first full-time Monroe County Department of Motor Vehicles Office, providing a central Downtown location for multiple motor vehicle needs. Taking care of these issues promptly is often critical to people who need their vehicles to get to work so I am proud that we've made this easier!

#### **Historic Fountain Restored** at the Public Market

A historic granite fountain once used to water horses has been restored to the Public Market.


The Market's fountain, one of only 125 such fountains made over a century ago, was an icon in the early years at 280 N. Union Street and is featured in many old Market photos.

Rochester received one of these fountains as a gift from the National Humane Alliance, which sought to promote animal welfare. The fountains created through this initiative were both beautiful and functional, providing a source of water for horses, dogs and other creatures, as well as spigots that allowed people to fill a cup with water.

While the Market's original fountain was carted away in the 1930s and may have been destroyed, the new fountain is one of the original 125. Discovered in Binghamton, the City was able to purchase it, restore it and place it at the Market.

This was a team effort and required generous support from the Valenti and Gugel families, the Market District Business Association, T.Y. Lin International, and the Rochester Area Community Foundation. Thanks also to The Friends of the Rochester Public Market for all their efforts to make this happen!

## Teens Create New Mural at the Central Library

The downstairs Link Level at the Central Library now features a hand-painted interactive mural conceived and created by a team of eight local teenagers.

In addition to the colorful design, there are several spots along the mural where visitors can pose for fun photos or selfies.

The idea to create a mural came from Library Director Patty Uttaro who discussed it with her Teen Services staff. Eight teenagers from the Teen Center then came up with an initial plan for the mural.

Local artist Chloe Smith was hired to work

with them and under her guidance, they finalized the design, cleaned and graphed the walls to prepare them, then completed the painting of this unique artistic piece in mid-September.
