








### Results of Survey #1: Goal Ratings



## Results of Survey #1: Revised Themes and Goals

### IMPROVE and EXPAND Accessibility and Connectivity

#### **GOALS**

1.

Provide a high-quality experience for people taking the bus by improving bus stops.

2.

Provide safe and accessible spaces for pedestrians and bicyclists of all abilities.

3.

Provide a comfortable walking experience with streetscape improvements including street trees, lighting, benches, and flower boxes.

Goals from Survey #1 were then condensed and refined to incorporate community priorities from Survey #1.

In Survey #2, we are asking the community to let us know if they feel these revised goals match the priorities and needs of their community.









# Results of Survey #1: Revised Themes and Goals

### SUPPORT and FOSTER Sustainable Communities

#### GOALS

1.

Expand and maintain clean, safe, and accessible sidewalks.

2.

Find temporary uses for vacant land before it's permanently developed or reused.

3.

Support existing businesses by expanding existing small business programs, and increase local job opportunities through workforce training and development.

4.

Support and expand high quality affordable housing opportunities and create strong anti-displacement policies before making major investments.









# Results of Survey #1: Revised Themes and Goals

CELEBRATE and PROMOTE History, Culture, and Legacy

#### GOALS

1.

Empower community organizations and residents to lead the development and implementation of the vision for West Main.

2.

Acknowledge, promote, and preserve elements of cultural significance - including the legacies of Susan B. Anthony, Frederick Douglass, and other leaders – while enhancing their relevance for current residents.

3.

Uplift the neighborhood by funding and promoting creative, community-oriented activities including street murals, sculptures, festivals, and other artistic expressions.









## Results of Survey #1: Draft Vision Statement

The West Main Multimodal Transportation and Place-making Plan is a transportation and public realm improvement effort rooted in an inclusive, community-based leadership and decision-making process.

The plan will focus on: (1) improving and expanding safety, comfort, and accessibility for people walking, biking, and taking the bus; (2) supporting and fostering sustainable economic activities and opportunities; and (3) celebrating and promoting the history, culture, legacy of surrounding communities.










### **Approach to Ground Truthing Data**











West Main Street carries bus riders between Downtown and Southwest Quadrant neighborhoods
















## Around 19,400 vehicles traveled along West Main each day in 2019.












In 2019, the average speed recorded on West Main was 33 mph

Fewer crashes and less severe crashes












# Only 6% of reported crashes involved a person biking or walking, but these crashes caused injuries at a greater rate
