Section 1. The Mayor is hereby authorized to enter into an agreement with the Empire Justice Center (EJC) for the receipt and use of \$15,000, which is hereby appropriated for Rochester Financial Empowerment Center operations, including providing counseling services to EJC clients that are eligible for the Child Tax Credit. The term of the agreement shall extend through December 31, 2021.

Section 2. The agreement authorized herein shall contain such additional terms and conditions as the Mayor deems to be appropriate.

Section 3. Comprehensive Plan 2034 Initiative Area: Reinforcing Strong Neighborhoods

Transmitted herewith for your approval is legislation authorizing the receipt and use of New York State Education Department, Division of Library Development (NYSED) construction grant funds in the amount of \$1,184,935 for the Lincoln Branch Library, and to amend Ordinance No. 2020-339 to accept additional NYSED construction grant funds for the Central Library Bausch & Lomb building HVAC project in the amount of \$37,516.

The Lincoln Branch project is a comprehensive interior and exterior renovation of the 1994constructed building, including a new canopy and storefront at the entrance of the library as well as library signage. Inside, relocations of circulation, children's, teen and adult service areas will be optimized for space utilization, sightlines, and expanded use by families to connect to the existing Toy Library. Restrooms will be renovated with entrance relocation for safety and direct staff sightlines. Painting the ceiling, new lighting and floor finishes will assist in brightening the entire library. Lastly, upgraded utilities will support additional power and data connection points in public spaces.

Each year the Monroe County Library System is allocated state funds for library construction projects, awarded on a competitive basis within the system. An estimated construction cost of \$1.7 million will be funded from the NYSED grant (\$1,184,935) and 2020-21 Library cash capital (\$600,000). The Library is eligible for up to a 90% NYSED funding match.

The Lincoln branch project is managed by the Department of Environmental Services, Bureau of Architecture and Engineering. Construction is anticipated to begin in March 2022, with bid in November 2021; construction is required by NYSED to be completed within three years of grant award.

The amendment to Ord. No. 2020-339 is due to additional funding made available from NYSED for eligible library construction projects. This will increase funding to the Central Library Bausch & Lomb building HVAC project from \$473,000 to \$510,516, with construction costs of \$1,050,516.

## Amending Ordinance No. 2020-339 relating to the Central Library Bausch & Lomb Building HVAC Project

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Council of the City of Rochester as follows:

Section 1. Ordinance No. 2020-339, authorizing the receipt and use of a grant to fund building improvements and repairs to the Rochester Public Library's Bausch & Lomb and Arnett Branch buildings, is hereby amended in Sections 1 and 3 thereof as follows to increase by \$37,516 the funding for the Bausch & Lomb building HVAC project:

Transmitted herewith for your approval is legislation authorizing an amendatory professional services agreement with Computer Technologies U.S.A., LLC d/b/a/ Blue Hill Data Services of Pearl River, New York (principal John M. Lalli), to allow the consultant to continue to provide

hosting, systems administration, disaster recovery, application support and operations support for the City's mainframe computer for four additional years.

The original agreement authorized in May 2017 in Ordinance No. 2017-82 provided \$1,869,600 as maximum compensation for a term of 5 years and six months. This legislation amends the agreement to extend the term for 4 years and increase the compensation by \$2,088,450 to a new total of \$3,958,050. The cost of those four additional years will be funded from future years' Budgets of the Information Technology Department (IT), contingent on approval, as follows.

Moreover, the amendatory agreement will provide the option to extend the term for up to three additional one-year periods for a maximum annual compensation of \$439,800 to be funded at that rate from each of the fiscal year 2027-28, 2028-29 and 2029-30 Budgets of IT, contingent upon approval. If the options are exercised that would increase the agreement's total term to twelve years and 6 month and the total maximum compensation to \$5,277,450.

The City's mainframe computer is located and serviced at the Blue Hill Facility in Pearl River, NY.

Section 1. The Mayor is hereby authorized to enter into an amendatory professional services agreement with Computer Technologies U.S.A. LLC, d/b/a/ Blue Hill Data Services to provide additional hosting, systems administration, disaster recovery, applications support and operations support for the City's mainframe computer. The agreement that was originally authorized in Ordinance No. 2017-82 is hereby amended to: extend the term for an additional four years with the option to extend for up to 3 additional periods of 1 year each; to increase the maximum compensation by \$2,088,450 to a new total of \$3,958,050; and, if the optional term extensions are utilized, to increase the maximum compensation by \$1,319,400 to a new total of \$5,277,450. The amendatory compensation for the initial term extension shall be funded in the amounts of \$329,250 from the 2022-23 Budget of the Information Technology Department (IT) and \$439,800 from each of the 2023-24, 2024-25, 2025-26 and 2026-27 Budgets of IT, contingent upon the approval of said budgets. Transmitted herewith for your approval is legislation establishing \$29,940 as maximum compensation for an agreement with FlashParking, Inc. Juan Rodriguez, principal, Austin, TX for Hardware As A Service (HaaS) for revenue control equipment rental at Genesee Crossroads Garage (69 Andrews Street).

New revenue control equipment has been installed at all City owned parking garages with the exception of Genesee Crossroads Parking Garage. The revenue control equipment is no longer functioning and is no longer supported at this garage. FlashParking, Inc. is a contract vendor through National Cooperative Purchasing Alliance (NCPA). NCPA is a cooperative that works to reduce the cost of goods and services. FlashParking, Inc. provides a cost effective parking garage revenue control equipment rental solution. Transient parkers can use a credit card at the exit and a mobile payment app. As with all of our credit card point-of-sale locations, there are credit card processing fees that the City will have to pay. The optional mobile app payment feature involves a \$.35 fee that will be paid by the parking patron.

A no RFP justification statement is attached. The contract term will be for two years beginning upon execution. The expense for the first year is \$15,420 (first month's fee is \$2,110 and each month thereafter is \$1,210). The expense for the second year is \$14,520 (monthly subscription fee for the second year is \$1,210). The cost will be funded from the 2021-22 Finance Department Operating Budget and future Finance Department Operating Budgets upon approval.

The increase in the stated purchase price is necessary because the previously stated amount incorrectly reflected a construction credit to the City in the amount of \$90,000 for work performed at the Chamber Building in space that the City is presently leasing to REDCO. <u>The correct amount of the credit is \$57,244 for REDCO's previous rented space at 80 Commercial Street, making the adjusted purchase price \$457,756.</u> The actual intended purchase price for 448 Smith Street has been \$515,000 all along.

The initial term will be five years beginning October 15, 2021 and ending October 14, 2026. The annual rent for the lease for the initial year, as established by an appraisal prepared in August 2021 by Bruckner, Tillett, Rossi, Cahill & Associates, will be \$24,000 \$23,004 payable in monthly installments of \$2,000 \$1,917. The prior lease with Hillside Children's Center was \$2,000 per month. Annual increases will be the lesser of the change in CPI-U for the Mid-Atlantic Region or 2%. There will be one optional five (5) year renewal.

This lease was approved by the Rochester Public Library Board of Trustees at its September 22, 2021 meeting.

Comprehensive Plan 2034 Initiative Area: Reinforcing Strong Neighborhoods

Transmitted herewith for your approval is legislation related to the change in the direction of traffic flow on Dunn Street. This legislation will authorize a change in the direction of traffic flow on Dunn Street, between Hudson Avenue and Roser Street, from two-way to one-way westbound.

The intersection of Dunn Street and Hudson Avenue was investigated for a high crash rate by the Monroe County Department of Transportation (MCDOT) in 2014. At that time, following a neighborhood meeting, a No Left Turn restriction was added to address the crashes. Residents were advised then that if the turn restriction did not reduce the frequency of crashes, a one-way westbound traffic flow change on Dunn Street would be required.

MCDOT conducted a new safety study earlier this year which again identified a persistent crash pattern at the intersection of Hudson Avenue and Dunn Street caused primarily by vehicles turning left onto Hudson Avenue from Dunn Street eastbound. As discussed in 2014, the study recommended that traffic flow on Dunn Street be changed to one-way westbound from Hudson Avenue to Roser Street to reduce serious crashes at that intersection. Notifications were sent to affected residents and property owners on August 25, 2021. The Traffic Control Board endorsed the change at its September 1, 2021 meeting.

A public hearing on the change in the direction of traffic flow is required.

Transmitted herewith for your approval is legislation related to the Genesee Street Reconstruction Project. This legislation will:

- 1. Authorize the Mayor to enter into an agreement with the New York State Department of Transportation (NYSDOT) necessary to participate in and administer the project; and,
- 2. Appropriate \$562,400 in anticipated reimbursements from the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) to finance a portion of the design, construction administration, and right-of-way acquisition services for the project; and,
- 3. Establish \$800,000 as maximum compensation for an agreement with Stantec Consulting Services Inc. (James R. Hofmann, Jr., Principal, 61 Commercial Street, Suite 100, Rochester, NY) for design, construction administration, and right-of-way acquisition services related to the Project.
- 4. Approve a resolution, in a form that is required by the New York State Department of Transportation (NYSDOT), that will confirm the City's prior authorizations of the Project, commit the City to pay for the State-funded portion of the Project in the first instance before seeking reimbursement from the State, and, if applicable, commit the City Council to meet promptly to consider appropriating money to make up any cost overruns.

This is a Federal Aid project administered by the City under agreement with the New York State Department of Transportation (NYSDOT).

The project will include pavement reconstruction, curbs, sidewalks, curb ramps, catch basins, manhole frames and covers, water main, water services, water anodes, hydrants, telecommunications conduit, street lighting, signal upgrades, signage, tree plantings, and other various streetscape improvements. The addition of on-street bicycle facilities and curb bump-outs will be evaluated during preliminary design. These improvements will enhance traffic safety and efficiency, improve the surface drainage and riding quality of the roadway, improve accessibility, and enhance the streetscape.

Stantec Consulting Services Inc. was selected to provide engineering design and construction administration services through a request for proposals process from the NYSDOT list of preapproved regional engineering firms, which is described in the attached summary.

Design services will begin in October 2021. Construction is anticipated to begin in spring 2024. The design and construction administration phase of the project will result in the creation and/or retention of the equivalent of 8.7 full-time jobs.

The agreement shall have a term of six (6) months after final acceptance of the Project.

#### Authorizing agreements and funding for the Genesee Street Reconstruction Project

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Council of the City of Rochester as follows:

Section 1. The Mayor is hereby authorized to enter into an agreement with the New York State Department of Transportation (NYSDOT) to participate in and administer the Genesee Street (Elmwood Avenue to Brooks Avenue) Reconstruction Project (the Project).

Section 2. The Mayor is hereby authorized to accept and use \$562,400 in anticipated reimbursements from the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), which amount is hereby appropriated to fund a portion of the costs of design, construction administration and right-of-way acquisition services for the Project.

Section 3. The Mayor is hereby authorized to enter into a professional services agreement with Stantec Consulting Services Inc. to provide design, construction administration and right-ofway acquisition services for the Project. The maximum compensation for the agreement shall be \$800,000, which shall be funded in the amounts of \$562,400 from FHWA reimbursements appropriated in Section 2 herein, \$122,515 from 2020-21 Cash Capital and \$115,085 from 2021-22 Cash Capital. The term of the agreement shall continue until six months after final acceptance of the Project.

Section 4. The agreements authorized shall contain such additional terms and conditions as the Mayor deems to be appropriate.

Section 5. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

THAT the sum of \$800,000 is hereby appropriated pursuant to Ordinance No. 2021-320 and made available to cover the cost of participation in the above described phase of the Project;

THAT in the event the full federal and non-federal share costs of the Project exceed the amount appropriated above, this Council shall convene as soon as possible to vote on an appropriation of said excess amount immediately upon notification by the City Engineer thereof;

THAT the Mayor is hereby authorized to execute all necessary Agreements, certifications or reimbursement requests for Federal Aid and/or Marchiselli Aid on behalf of the City of Rochester with the New York State Department of Transportation in connection with the advancement or approval of the Project and providing for the administration of the Project and the City's first instance funding of Project costs and permanent funding of the local share of federal-aid and stateaid eligible Project costs and all Project costs within appropriations therefor that are not so eligible;

THAT a certified copy of this resolution be filed with the New York State Commissioner of Transportation by attaching it to any necessary Agreement in connection with the Project; and THAT this Resolution shall take effect immediately.

Transmitted herewith for your approval is legislation authorizing an agreement with Kim Lundgren Associates, Inc. (KLA), Kim Lundgren, Chief Executive Officer, 10 Post Office Square, 8th Floor, Boston, MA 02109. This legislation will establish \$100,000 as total maximum compensation for a professional services agreement with KLA for services related to updating the municipal and community-wide greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions inventories and developing a heat emergency plan for the City of Rochester.

The cost of the agreement will be financed with \$50,000 of the NYSDEC Climate Smart Communities Program grant funds appropriated in June 2020 via Ordinance No. 2020-193 and \$50,000 from fiscal year 2019-2020 Cash Capital.

Updating the City's municipal and community-wide GHG emissions inventories and developing a heat emergency plan will help the City mitigate the effects of climate change and prepare for anticipated climate change impacts, creating a sustainable community, ready for continued growth and vibrancy. The new GHG inventories will update previously completed GHG inventories and evaluate progress toward the City's Climate Action Plan emissions reduction goals of 20% by 2020 and 40% by 2030. The heat emergency plan will assist the City to increase heat safety awareness and reduce negative public health impacts that can occur during high-heat events, which are anticipated to increase in our region as a result of climate change.

In August 2021, the City's Office of Energy and Sustainability solicited proposals to develop updates of municipal and community-wide GHG emissions inventories and a heat emergency plan. KLA was selected based on the quality and thoroughness of their proposal, experience and expertise of the proposed project team, ability to meet the City's schedule, and the reasonableness of the cost of their proposal.

The agreement will have an initial term of two years with provisions for a renewal for up to two additional one-year periods based on mutual written agreement.

The project is expected to be completed by October 2024.

1. Authorize acquisition, by negotiation, of two de minimus portions of parcels as follows:

The acquisitions are required for the addition of a right turn lane on South Avenue at the south intersection approach with Elmwood Avenue and for the installation of a 10 foot wide shared use path along Elmwood Avenue. The value of the property to be acquired at 1600-1650 South Avenue, some of which will be acquired by title fee and some of which will consist of a temporary easement, was established by an independent appraisal performed by R.K. Hite Co., Inc. The property acquisition required for 1111 Elmwood Avenue is being donated to the City by the State of New York. The total acquisition costs, including closing costs, will not exceed \$40,000 and will be funded from 2021-22 Cash Capital.

2. Authorize changes in pavement width required as listed below:

#### A. On South Avenue:

- a) A tapered variable increase in pavement width of 12 feet, from 40 feet to 52 feet, beginning approximately 200 feet south of Elmwood Avenue and continuing approximately 50 feet northward; and,
- b) An increase in pavement width of 12 feet, from 40 feet to 52 feet, beginning approximately 150 feet south of Elmwood Avenue and continuing northward to Elmwood Avenue; and,
- c) An increase in pavement width of 2 feet from 40 feet to 42 feet, from Elmwood Avenue to Gold Street; and,
- d) A decrease in pavement width of 8 feet, from 40 feet to 32 feet, from Langslow Street and continuing northward approximately 90 feet; and,
- e) A tapered variable increase in pavement width of 8 feet to 0 feet, beginning approximately 90 feet north of Langslow Street and continuing northward approximately 20 feet; and,
- f) A tapered variable increase in pavement width of 2 feet, from 40 feet to 42 feet, beginning approximately 100 feet south of Wall Street to Wall Street; and,
- g) An increase in pavement width of 2 feet from Wall Street to Highland Avenue; and,
- h) A decrease in pavement width of 6 feet, from 40 feet to 34 feet, from Highland Avenue to Pavilion Street; and,
- i) A tapered variable decrease in pavement width of 6 feet to 12 feet, from 40 feet to 34 - 28 feet, beginning at Pavilion Street and continuing northward approximately 75 feet; and,
- j) A tapered variable decrease in pavement width of 12 feet, from 40 feet to 28 feet, beginning approximately 75 feet north of Pavilion Street to Robinson Drive; and,
- k) A decrease in pavement width of 8 feet, from 40 feet to 32 feet, from Robinson Drive and continuing northward approximately 560 feet; and,
- A tapered variable increase in pavement width of 8 feet to 0 feet, beginning approximately 100 feet south of Bellevue Drive and continuing northward approximately 200 feet.

B. On Elmwood Avenue:

- a) A tapered variable decrease in pavement width of 8 feet, from 63 feet to 55 feet, from Mt Hope Avenue to Westview Terrace; and,
- b) A decrease in pavement width of 3 feet, from 58 feet to 55 feet, from Westview Terrace to South Avenue.

The project will include pavement reconstruction, curbs, sidewalks, curb ramps, catch basins, manhole frames and covers, water main, water services, hydrants, telecommunications conduit, street lighting, signal upgrades, signage, tree plantings, bicycle accommodations, and other various streetscape improvements. These improvements will enhance traffic safety and efficiency, improve the surface drainage and riding quality of the roadway, improve accessibility, and enhance the streetscape.

Public meetings were held on October 20, 2020 and July 15, 2021. A copy of the meeting minutes are attached. The pavement width changes were endorsed by the Traffic Control Board at the August 18, 2021 meeting.

Construction is anticipated to begin in spring 2022 with substantial completion in fall 2023.

A public hearing on the pavement width changes is required.

- b) An increase in pavement width of 12 feet, from 40 feet to 52 feet, beginning approximately 150 feet south of Elmwood Avenue and continuing northward to Elmwood Avenue;
- c) An increase in pavement width of 2 feet, from 40 feet to 42 feet, beginning on the north side Elmwood Avenue and continuing northward to Gold Street;
- d) A decrease in pavement width of 8 feet, from 40 feet to 32 feet, beginning at Langslow Street and continuing northward approximately 90 feet;
- e) A tapered variable increase in pavement width of 8 feet to 0 feet, beginning approximately 90 feet north of Langslow Street and continuing northward approximately 20 feet;
- f) A tapered variable increase in pavement width of 2 feet, from 40 feet to 42 feet, beginning approximately 100 feet south of Wall Street and continuing northward to Wall Street;
- g) An increase in pavement width of 2 feet, beginning at Wall Street and continuing northward to Highland Avenue;
- h) A decrease in pavement width of 6 feet, from 40 feet to 34 feet, beginning at Highland Avenue and continuing northward to Pavilion Street;
- A tapered variable decrease in pavement width of 6 feet to 12 feet, from 40 feet to 34 -28 feet, beginning at Pavilion Street and continuing northward approximately 75 feet;
- j) A tapered variable decrease in pavement width of 12 feet, from 40 feet to 28 feet, beginning approximately 75 feet north of Pavilion Street and continuing to Robinson Drive;

- k) A decrease in pavement width of 8 feet, from 40 feet to 32 feet, beginning at Robinson Drive and continuing northward approximately 560 feet; and
- A tapered variable increase in pavement width of 8 feet to 0 feet, beginning approximately 100 feet south of Bellevue Drive and continuing northward approximately 200 feet.
- B. On Elmwood Avenue:
  - a) A tapered variable decrease in pavement width of 8 feet, from 63 feet to 55 feet, beginning at Mt Hope Avenue and continuing eastward to Westview Terrace; and
  - b) A decrease in pavement width of 3 feet, from 58 feet to 55 feet, beginning at Westview Terrace and continuing eastward to South Avenue.

The pavement width changes authorized herein shall be made in accordance with plans and specifications approved by the City Engineer, who may make reasonable modifications.

Section 6. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The program and the All City Youth Gospel Choir will serve up to 140 youth ages 8 and older at the David F. Gantt R-Center.

The ROCmusic program began in 2012 as a partnership between the City, Hochstein School of Music & Dance, University of Rochester Eastman School of Music, Eastman Community Music School, Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra, and the Rochester City School District. The program has served 487 students since its inception.

- 2. Student mediation PTP staff will facilitate student mediation sessions with students involved in disputes (and families as needed).
- 3. Student re-entry services PTP staff, in conjunction with the school's parent liaison, will develop and implement a safety plan for students re-entering the school after a period of absence due to violence.

The Board of Education approved this agreement at their August 26, 2021 meeting. Pathways to Peace has provided these services to the District since 2016.

The model has been effective in bridging the gap between anti-violence programming such as outreach and breaking the cycle for the hard to reach populations at the center of violence in urban areas.

The Rochester Market Driven Community Corporation is a 501(c)(3) organization which has reorganized to launch the City Sustainability Institute as an adult workforce development and cooperative initiative rooted in urban agriculture and focused on individuals re-entering the community from incarceration. City Sustainability Institute will provide vocational training programs including skilled trades which can support transitioning individuals into the workforce for agriculture-focused industries. The Institute will include wrap around support services, peer navigators, and wealth building skills including financial literacy and entrepreneurship. The program anticipates serving up to 1,500 residents each year. A justification for not issuing a request for proposals is attached.

- 2. Amend the 2021-22 Budget of Undistributed by \$300,000 to reflect the appropriation authorized herein.
- 3. Authorize an amendatory agreement with the Young Adults Manufacturer Training Employment Program, Inc. (YAMTEP) (Tyrone Reaves, CEO, Rochester, New York) for an additional \$300,000 for a total of \$600,000 maximum annual compensation to provide adult employment skills training services. This agreement was originally authorized via City Council Ordinance 2021–168. The term of this agreement will be for one year.

Under this amendatory agreement, YAMTEP will engage an additional 90 adults with low or no math and engineering skills and provide basic manufacturing skills training and practical experience as well as opportunities to network with local manufacturing companies and potential employers. Since July 2018, more than 308 people have graduated from YAMTEP.

The amendment shall increase the maximum compensation provided under the existing agreement, which was authorized in Ordinance No. 2021-168, by \$300,000 to a new total of \$600,000. The term of the agreement shall remain one year. The \$300,000 increase in maximum compensation shall be funded from the ARPA funds appropriated to the 2021-22 Budget for Undistributed Expenses in Section 3 herein.

Section 5. The agreements authorized herein shall contain such additional terms and conditions as the Mayor deems to be appropriate.

Section 6. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Ordinance No. 2021-337 (Int. No. 344)

#### An Ordinance Establishing a Notification and Access Policy

WHEREAS, prompt knowledge of certain types of incidents as well as access to information about those incidents is a necessity to insure transparency and to permit Council to perform its oversight role; and

WHEREAS, there have been incidents of a lack of prompt reporting to the Council and in some cases to the Mayor; and

WHEREAS, in particular, information regarding interactions between the Rochester Police and the members of the community is of particular concern to the Council;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, by the Council of the City of Rochester as follows:

Section 1- The Council of the City of Rochester shall receive direct and immediate notification within 24 hours of incidents involving the Rochester Police Department as to:

a-any officer involved shooting b-any other use of force that results in serious physical injury or death of a civilian c-any vehicular pursuit that results in a serious accident or serious injury d-any incident involving physical restraint of a child under the age of 12 e-any use of chemicals, Tasers or other force against a child under 12 f-any use of force/chemicals/LRADS or other actions in response to a civilian protest

Section 2- The Council of the City of Rochester shall receive access, in unredacted form, to all body worn camera footage of officers as soon as the same is available to the Chief of Police. They shall be entitled to view the footage through a digital reading room that allows them to view and discuss the footage outside of the presence of members of the Rochester Police Department.

Section 3- That the Council understands and expects that all information provided to City Council by the terms of this ordinance shall also be provided to the Mayor.

Section 4- That this ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Ordinance No. 2021-338 (Int. No. 345)

#### An Ordinance Amending the Municipal Code in Relation to Reporting of Denied Freedom of Information Requests

WHEREAS, Chapter 18 of the Code of the City of Rochester governs public records; and

WHEREAS, Section 18-1 of that Chapter establishes municipal attorneys (as designated by the Mayor) as Records Access Officers and further establishes the Corporation Counsel to hear and determine all appeals of denial of access to records; and

WHEREAS, the Council of the City of Rochester affirms its interest in the City providing all possible records access available by law; and

WHEREAS, in the interest of serving in its role of oversight as well as encouraging transparency, the Council believes it must be aware of all denials of freedom of information requests (and the reasons therefore) and the denial of all appeals (as well as the reasons therefore);

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, by the Council of the City of Rochester as follows:

Section 1- Chapter 18 of the Municipal Code, Public Records, as amended, is hereby further amended by adding a new sub-section C to Section 18-1 as follows:

C. The Records Access Officer shall provide the Council of the City of Rochester with a monthly report of all denied records access requests including the identity of the requestor, a brief summary of the nature of the request and the reason for the denial. Further, the Corporation Counsel shall provide the Council of the City of Rochester with a separate monthly report of all denied appeals

including the identity of the requestor, the nature of the request and the reason for the denial of the appeal.

Section 2- This ordinance shall take effect immediately.
