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Who we are and What we do

General History:

- Chartered by the Rochester Police Department in 1995 and implemented in 1996, based on what is now an International program originated by the Miami Police Department in 1990
- In March 2000, incorporated as a 501(c)3 nonprofit corporation, functioning under the auspices of the City of Rochester Police Department and overseen by an appointed Board of Directors

Program Goals:

- Promote positive behavior among local students by reinforcing socially desirable behavior among youth in the community
- Reward students who are involved in making good choices and publicly highlight their accomplishments in the media to demonstrate that good kids are news worthy
- Foster positive relationships between law enforcement and youth by building bridges of trust, understanding and civic responsibility

What We Do:

- Students in Monroe County, in grades 1-12, may be nominated by any adult, at least 18 years old
- Students can be nominated for any good deed or accomplishment, such as; civic responsibility/volunteerism, heroic acts, helping law enforcement and first responders, leadership/quick thinking, "Good Samaritan" acts and overcoming personal challenges.
- Students must attend school within Monroe County and have performed the act for which he/she is nominated within a year of being nominated and within Monroe County.
- Recipients of the award must be students in good standing and are chosen by a tally of votes from our Selection Committee. The Committee is comprised of representatives of our sponsors, as well as, community businesses/organizations
- Award recipients are celebrated publicly in a bi-monthly ceremony hosted by the Rochester Police Department and are presented a prize package comprised of generous gifts from our sponsors.

Kenneth Cruz

12th grade

School of the Arts

Kenneth Cruz is a Senior at the School of the Arts and was nominated by a teacher, Mr. Laird, who witnessed Kenneth's potential and leadership potential when handling a potentially explosive situation. Mr. Laird witnessed a situation at school where 2 students were arguing and two groups appeared to be circling waiting for a physical confrontation. Mr. Laird observed Kenneth situate himself between the 2 arguing students and heard Kenneth articulately and firmly talk them down from getting physical; Kenneth told them things like, "fighting is counterproductive"; they would be suspended and lose class time and that they would disappoint their families by being stupid. The 2 students clearly wanted to settle things physically but Kenneth talked them out of it and dismissed the other students as well. While neither the police department nor Mr. Laird recommend that students intercede in a confrontation, Mr. Laird said that it is rare to see a student take the initiative to stop a confrontation with words and an authoritative manner; especially when others could turn on him for stepping in.

Mr. Laird was very impressed that Kenneth took personal and proactive responsibility to forestall a wrong when he could have continued on his way to class and never gotten involved at all. For Mr. Laird this constituted a very "right thing" and illustrates Kenneth's leadership potential.

On July 22nd, 911 Operator Louis Schwiegert had the pleasure of speaking with Latifah when she called 911 to get medical help for her Mother. While Mom was very upset in the background, Latifah remained calm and was able to answer all questions asked of her. Mr. Schwiegert said "It was impressive to hear someone able to give all information asked and not skip a beat. I am very impressed with the maturity of this young person.

Council Rock School

Luis Delgado is a second grader at Council Rock School in Brighton. Luis was nominated by City Recreation supervisor, Michael Porter, who was impressed with Luis' honesty and integrity at such a young age. Luis came into the Rec office with his Aunt over the summer carrying a twenty dollar bill that he had found by the football field. He wanted to turn it in so the owner would be able to claim it. Mr. Porter said, "It is wonderful to see a young man of 6 yrs. old that has learned that "finders" is not always "keepers".





Jadaya Matthews

Jadaya was outside at play in May when one of her friends, Niya Jones, fell off her bike into a storm drain and was seriously injured. Jadaya helped Niya get to a safe place and got her the medical help she needed. Niya suffered a broken arm and received 5 stitches to her leg. Jadaya is described by school administrators as kind and respectful to adults and someone who has the potential to be a leader and a woman of power.

On June 29, 2015 around 2:15 pm, Ja-mes noticed and investigated smoke coming from a home at 203 Terrace Park in the City of Rochester. Realizing the house was on fire and that his elderly neighbor, Ms. Clark is almost always inside, he sprinted home in an effort to make a 911 call. At home, he told his Mother of his findings and she placed the one and only 911 call that was received to report the fire with a person trapped. The Rochester Fire Department responded and had the fire under control within 14 minutes. Ja-mes had to be discouraged by a neighbor from trying to enter the house to get Ms. Clark himself Ms. Clark was located inside, CPR was administered and she has since recovered. This was truly a situation where every second counted and those saved seconds began with Ja-mes. Ja-mes was nominated for this award by RFD Captain Joseph Luna.





Christian Rodriguez 11th Grade

Integrated Arts on Franklin Campus

Christian was nominated by RPD Officer Kenneth Richardson who answered a 911 call after Christian found what appeared to be a loaded handgun. The gun was actually a .177 caliber pellet gun but had all the hallmarks of a semi-automatic .45 caliber handgun. The gun could only be distinguished as a deadly weapon when handled. Christian guarded the weapon until Officers arrived, knowing he would miss his bus to school. Some may have used this as an excuse to skip the rest of the day but Christian made it clear to Officer Richardson that he needed help getting to school and preferably on time. We see examples everyday that the culture of "no snitching" is pervasive among teens. Officer Richardson found it inspiring to come across a young man who knows the difference between "snitching" and "doing the right thing".

Haley was nominated by City Recreation Supervisor, Don Corey, for her compassion and volunteerism. Haley approached Mr. Corey in October asking to volunteer with youth. Josip Lepki 7th grade Oliver Middle School (Brockport)

Josip was nominated by a friend of his Mom's, Julie Kolb, who was impressed by his thoughtfulness. Julie posted a Facebook status asking friends with sons for ideas on what toys are popular for 12 year old boys. She needed the information to give her ideas for a donation to her church's drive to collect new gifts at Christmas for those less fortunate. Josip had been at a "Breakfast with Santa" event that morning where he received a Nerf toy gun. Joe's Mom checked with Joe for ideas. When asked, Joe told his Mom to give Julie the Nerf gun because he really didn't need it.





Lorenzo Guerrero 1st grade English Village Elementary (Greece)

Lorenzo was nominated by a fellow parishioner, Officer Gonzalez, who was impressed with Lorenzo's sense of civic responsibility. In December, Lorenzo was with his Dad at a barbershop waiting for haircuts when a patron leaving the shop dropped what was described as a large "wad" of money. Lorenzo immediately picked up the money and ran after the patron and returned the money without anyone prompting him to do so. The patron was so impressed with Lorenzo's actions, that he came back in the Barbershop and gave Lorenzo five dollars School staff describes Lorenzo as responsible, respectful and kind.





Shira Silverstein

9th grade

Honeoye Falls-Lima High School

Shira was nominated by her mother for her dedication to helping her community. In her 8th grade year, Shira spent 100 hours collecting hundreds of books for the Rochester International Academy in Rochester for a Girl Scout project. Shira cleaned up each book by taking off any stickers and erasing any names on the books, sorting the books by level of difficulty and stamping each one with a "This book belongs to…" stamp, so students could write their name in their "new" books. The students at this school have come here from other countries and many are refugees. The students were so happy to receive books they could call their own, that Shira decided to collect more books not as a project but just because. In December 2015, Rochester International Academy had a holiday party where Shira donated over 500 books that she had collected and cleaned up throughout the year. School staff describes Shira as the type of student you wish you had more of: intrinsically motivated, strong academically and also manages to balance commitments in school and outside of school.





Kesean Haten

12th grade

Joseph C. Wilson HS (Rochester)

Kesean was nominated by the social worker at his school, Ms. Tanner, for his respectfulness and compassionate concern. In February, several female students began a verbal confrontation in the crowded cafeteria. While re-directing one of the girls, the altercation became physical with Ms. Tanner caught in the middle and unable to escape because of the pressing crowd around the altercation. Kesean made his way to Ms. Tanner and used his physical presence to shield her until the altercation stopped. Ms. Tanner believes that she would have been injured if Kesean had not stepped up to help her. School staff describes Kesean as compassionate, motivated, well liked and respected by his peers.

Olympia High School (Greece)

While Jamier was talking with the two students, one of the students pulled out a knife and began to menace Jamier's classmate with the knife. Because of Jamier's ability to distract the boys from attacking his classmate, his classmate was able to run back inside the school for safety. Both students ran from the school grounds, and Jamier was instrumental with school staff in helping to identity the students involved in this incident.

Peter was nominated by family friend, Diane Sturmer, for his volunteerism and commitment to community. Here is what Diane had to say: Peter is a young man of character and integrity He is the kind of guy that will mow your lawn and not expect anything in return. And, he did just this when I was having health issues and my husband was caring for me last summer. Peter has been a Jr. High Sunday School Leader for the past 2 years at his church. This has been a two hour commitment per week. He also helped run a Sunday school group of 7th and 8th graders. He has also helped run a Bible camp for younger children these last few years. One of the most impressive volunteer outreaches that Peter has been involved with for the last five years is Flower City work camp. Each spring break, Peter repair homes in the City of Rochester. Through the Boy Scouts organization, Peter has been involved in National Youth Leadership Training. The first year he took the course and then he volunteered on staff for the following 2 years. Johnathan is a middle school student who frequently gets a ride to school from his mother because she works in our high school cafeteria. One morning in March, Johnathan noticed that his mom was "driving funny" on the way to drop him off at school. He talked with his Mom about other recent accidents that had happened in the community and encouraged her to stop driving and go home, or call his Dad. She insisted on bringing him to school and getting to work on time. When Johnathan arrived at school, he went directly to the Health Office and shared his concern about his Mom "driving funny", and his concern about whether she made it to work. The High School nurse, Mrs. Buckley, immediately went to the cafeteria to check on Johnathan's mom. Mrs. Buckley credits Johnathan's ability to stay calm, report his concern, and take positive action which

directly impacted the outcome of his Mom's medical situation in a positive way. The timing of her treatment was imperative to her health and recovery, and Mrs. Buckley believes he contributed to saving his Mom's life.

Family Celebration @ Seabreeze Amusement Park-June 24, 2016


