


"Do The Right Thing" Program History

- ** The "DO THE RIGHT THING" program was born in the Miami Police Department in 1990. On October 7th, 1995, the model was adapted by the Rochester Police Department when they received permission to start a Rochester Chapter of "DO THE RIGHT THING"
- ** "DO THE RIGHT THING" was instituted to reward children for their positive accomplishments and to enhance the lives of many of our city's needy youth
- ** "DO THE RIGHT THING" Award program was established, with students selected on a bimonthly basis for recognition by the police department for their outstanding accomplishments
- ** "DO THE RIGHT THING" will continue to build a sense of mutual respect and understanding between young people and police officers by initiating new projects and activities to stimulate the relationship
- ** "DO THE RIGHT THING" mission statement:

"The mission of Do The Right Thing of Rochester is to foster a positive relationship between the Rochester Police Department and Rochester's youth. The "Do The Right Thing" award program recognizes Rochester youth for their positive behavior, accomplishments and good deeds by distinguishing school-age children who strive to make good choices, do well in school, make a difference in their communities or demonstrate turnaround behavior."



Bushra Mamdoh 9th grade Thomas Jefferson High School

Emergency Communications Department, 911 dispatcher Sue Melia nominated Bushra for calling 911 requesting assistance for her father who is disabled and whom she found passed out. Bushra, realizing it was a medical emergency, calmly described to the 911 operator what was happening to her father. Ms. Melia stated "Bushra did an excellent job answering all the emergency medical questions, followed instructions as they were given and monitored her father's condition until help arrived. There is no doubt Bushra's quick thinking and calm demeanor was a key factor in getting her father the medical help he needed. Bushra came to the United States from Iraq in 2008, is an excellent student who loves reading, cooking and helping her family.



Jonee Mathews 7thGrade Urban Choice Charter School

Ms. Tonya Mathews, Jonee's aunt, nominated her for the quick actions Jonee took on May 13, 2010. On this date Jonee and her cousin were at school enjoying lunch when her cousin began to choke. Jonee reacted by hitting him in the back, this action caused the food item to dislodge, allowing for her cousin to breath. In her words "I hit him and the piece went down, I looked at Calvin, he had tears in his eyes, I asked Calvin, "are you o.k.?" he said

yes; both laughed about the incident and continued on. Jonee is described by Ms Ashline as a hard working student with a positive attitude, who thrives to be a consistent role model for all students. Coincidentally, the day of the ceremony was also Calvin's birthday and he attended to help celebrate Jonee.



Stephanie Wierzba Rush-Henrietta Senior High School

12th Grade

Stephanie is an outstanding student, a motivated volunteer and a positive role model for others. Nominated by her mother, Stephanie has maintained a high grade point average throughout high school while taking increasingly rigorous courses. She is an active volunteer in Teen A.T.T.I.T.U.D.E., a mentoring program for teenage girls, and helps prepare materials and modify activities for the Rochester City School District's Great Beginnings program. Linda and Jessica volunteered to walk Ms. Sawdey to her appointment. The appointment was for 11:20 am and the girls arrived at 10:45 am. The girls waited at the Doctor's office and walked Ms Sawdey back home. These sisters also helped take care of her dog while she was unable to and sent her get well cards. Linda is described by her teacher Ms. Laurienzo as a student who displays courage, respect and responsibility. Ms. Murphy describes Jessica as a genuine person, who helps out when she can, and works hard on her school work.

Emergency Communications Department 911 Telecommunicator, Joe Commesso, nominated Jamir for being brave and courageous when he called in a fight involving youth and possible weapons. Jamir provided information on both the victim and suspects, the information provided allowed for officers to respond immediately helping defuse the situation. There is no doubt that Jamir's quick action of calling 911 prevented someone from getting seriously hurt. Jamir is described by his teacher as a young person who is responsible, respectful and values his education.



Hailey Ballone 1st grade Jefferson Road Elementary School

Hailey was nominated by her grandmother Dawn Taylor for cutting her waist length hair and donating it to Locks of Love Organization. Her intention is to grow it out again and to have it re-cut. For the past two years Hailey has also been involved in the City's Pac-Tac and National Night out activities; helping pass out information flyers for a neighborhood association as well participating in Public Safety Festivals. She was a leader in getting younger children involved in walking on saturation walks with Crime Prevention Officer Wetzel. Hailey is also a Daisy Scout with a heart of gold. She is described by Principal Schwab as a very helpful and great young girl.



Anija and Brianna Rivera 12th Grade West Irondequoit High School

Twin sisters Anija and Brianna were nominated by their grandmother Vilma Burgos -Torres for their willingness to help others by giving up some of their summer vacation time the past two years to volunteer with their church, Spiritus Christi Senior Youth Group Ministries. This summer, the twins gave up their passion for playing soccer to go to Pittsburgh, PA;

while there they worked with inner city children at a summer camp. The children were Kindergarten-1st graders and very poor. Although they come from a large family that has had its share of challenges, the girls recognized that there are children less fortunate than themselves. They told their grandmother that the experience has taught them that although they may encounter situations in life that they do not like, they know that they may be able to make a difference. School Counselor Ken Eckman describes both Anija and Brianna as a respectful, conscientious, kind and motivated young ladies, who carry themselves as a positive example to their peers. Dave Foster the Youth Group Ministry advisor shares that the twins have participated in this ministry for the past four years, always eager to lead and volunteer by service to others.



Kenneth Brach
7th grade
Dake Junior High School

Kenneth is an 11-year-old autistic boy who was nominated by his grandmother Marcia Povio for his heroic actions in saving a child from drowning. Kenneth was in his backyard pool on July 8 when he noticed something was wrong. His 7-year-old cousin Andrew had slid into the pool from a slide but did not resurface. Kenneth jumped in and struggled to pull Andrew to the surface. With the help of Kenneth's mother, they got Andrew out of the pool where Kenneth's mom performed CPR until police and ambulance arrived. His actions helped save his cousin's life. Kenneth is a student, who puts forth tremendous effort; who challenges himself to reach his goals. Kenneth's teacher said, "Kenny is a kind and bright young man who deserves to be recognized for his great actions."

overturned. Samia freed herself and
then climbed over the seats to where
her six-year-old niece was stuck in her
seatbelt. Samia was able to free her
from the wreckage and pull her from
the vehicle, which was beginning to
smoke. Lt. Lindauer praised Samia's

ability to stay calm under adverse conditions and ensure the safety of her niece. Samia is a compassionate, hardworking student who earns praise from school staff who describes her as a "loving, caring student who never gives up on anyone or anything." Samia shared with Lt. Lindauer that she would like to become a police officer.



Shahia Anderson 4th Grade Urban Choice Charter School

Shahia was recognized for her quick thinking when her younger sister suffered an asthma attack while riding on the bus on the way home from school. When Shahia realized that the bus driver did not hear her sister when she yelled for help, she asked a friend to use her cell phone to call home. She was able to explain to her mother what was happening and the bus was. Her mom was able to get the bus to stop, at which time, the driver was made aware of the

situation. Both Shahia and her sister were then driven to a Hospital Emergency Room where her younger sister was treated for breathing difficulties. Shahia was nominated by her mother who said she is proud that her daughter knew what to do when her sister needed help. Shahia is described by her teacher as a helpful student, a great listener, and someone who encourages others to make wise choices.



Abdoul Sow 8th Grade Jefferson High School

Abdoul was nominated by his soccer coach and school athletic director, Mr. Boundy, for doing the right thing when he found a wallet someone had dropped in the school lunch line. After discovering the wallet, he immediately presented it to his coach, who said he would turn it in to the lost and found. When the coach went to the main office, he met a teacher who was very distraught over misplacing her wallet, which

included cash, credit cards and other important information. When she opened the wallet, everything was still there. According to his coach, Abdoul is a dedicated student and avid soccer player who demonstrates the type of behavior expected of Rochester City District Students.



Sierra Mattice Amy Torres 12th Grade School of Applied Technology @ Edison

Sierra and Amy were nominated by their teacher Ms. Sue Weiland for protecting another student from being harassed on the bus and for standing up for what is right. Both girls noticed a student being bullied by three other students. When the bullies tripped the boy, and called him

obscene names Sierra and Amy both told them to stop and leave him alone. They told their teacher about the incident the next day and then asked if they could talk to the principal of the other students' school. They contacted the principal to share information on the incident and identified some of the students involved in an attempt to keep this from reoccurring. Both Amy's and Sierra's actions demonstrate that bystanders can make a difference. Sierra is involved with the Model UN program and the school newspaper; Amy is treasurer of the Senior Class and participates in the Youth Construction Initiative Program. Both have applied for college at RIT.

On October 10, Luke and his friend Evan were about to head outside to play basketball when Luke noticed the house across the street was on fire. He notified his parents and while his mother called 911, Evan, Luke and Luke's father Robert ran across the street to notify the elderly occupant of the house. When Mr. Trowbridge entered the house, he found the woman dazed and confused on the coach and

escorted her from the house. When she tried to return to look for her cat, Luke and Evan found her and walked her across the street to safety. As they were leaving, oxygen tanks located on the property started to explode but due to their courage and quick thinking, no one was injured. Both students as well as Mr. Trowbridge did an exceptional, unselfish act and serve as positive role models for others; Luke and Evan are active in a variety of sports and volunteer their time in their community. Evan is consistently challenging himself both academically and personally. Luke is constantly striving to improve his academic performance and is one of a few enrolled in the New Visions Program.

Tess was nominated by Ms. Melanie Mason the school Attendance Office staff person for her honesty and caring for others. On October 4, Tess found a wallet containing a large amount of money and valuables in the girls' restroom at school. Without hesitation she returned it to the school main office. The week before, Tess's own wallet with \$200 and her cell phone were stolen out of her book bag during lunch. Tess said she knew how she felt when her valuables were stolen and did not want the other student to feel the same way. Tess's actions speak volumes about her character and compassion. She is described by school officials as someone who works to the best of her ability; a dedicated student who strives for excellence every day, and is involved in the Student Government Committee and The Hillside Work Scholarship Program.

Sir William and Charles were nominated by the School Resource Officer Virgil Ross for their courage and willingness to get involved when several males attacked and attempted to rob a fellow football player after a game. During the attack, their friend was stabbed several times requiring hospitalization. In order to help their friend, they provided information to their school principal that helped lead to an arrest of a suspect. It took courage for both Sir William and Charles to come forward. Both boys are active in sports, and are looking forward to playing basketball soon.

I'nyce was nominated by day care provider Ms. Catherine Marcano, for her observation skills and quick thinking. On October 12, 2010, I'nyce observed a large cloud of thick black smoke outside, indicating a serious fire. She went to look and observed a car parked behind the church next to her home engulfed in flames. Realizing the danger, she immediately notified the adults

in the area who called 911. The car was destroyed but because of l'nyce's willingness to get involved, there was no further property loss and no one was hurt. I'nyce is described by her teacher, Ms. Delgudico, as a hard working student who is thoughtful and caring and looks out for the well being of others.



Jayleen Amoroso Maya Daniels 8th Grade Calkins Road Middle School

Jayleen and her friend Maya were nominated by their school counselor, Ms. Amy Daniels, for intervening when a group of 7th grade boys were engaging in teasing and horseplay during lunch to the point where a boy who was the target of their teasing became visibly upset. Both Jayleen and Maya confronted the boys on their behavior, telling them that they had no right to treat another

human being that way! Jayleen's teachers describe her as a ray of sunshine, who is a positive role model for her peer group. Maya mentors a group of 6th graders at Calkins Road Middle School where she is referred to as a "web leader" and remains cooperative and positive no matter what challenges come her way.



Kayla Smith 7th Grade School Without Walls Foundation Academy

Kayla was nominated by her mother Angel Smith for the bravery she demonstrated in coming forward to the aide of others. Kayla was the "new girl" at school, hadn't made any acquaintances yet and is very shy. During the first two weeks of the school year, there were a couple of girls on the school bus who were being severely bullied. The following day, Kayla went to the school principal and told him what

she saw. Kayla's courage in coming forward in this situation is an example to all that bullying is unacceptable and that people should not sit quietly by and allow it to continue.



Treasure Beacoats 11th Grade Global Media Arts @ Franklin High School

Treasure was nominated by School Resource Officer Bryan Johnson, because of her involvement in a potentially dangerous incident. She overheard the victim of a crime, a fellow student, explaining to another student, what had happened to him/her. Treasure intervened and tried to get the victimized student to report what had happened, but the student was too afraid and refused to come

forward. Treasure immediately recognized the danger the situation posed to everyone in the school and, without regard to the consequences, went directly to school security and the principal to report what she knew. As a result of her actions, an investigation was conducted and the guilty parties were arrested and charged with the crime. Reaching out and helping others seems to be naturally part of Treasure's character. When Treasure was 11, she rescued her sister from a fire and received recognition from the Fire Department in the town where the family lived at the time.



Jessica DeRoller 11th Grade

Bishop Kearney High School

Sandy DeRoller, Jessica's mother, nominated her for caring about others and civic responsibility. After losing her grandmother to cancer, Jessica began volunteering at the Strong Memorial Cancer Center. Through her involvement there, she was asked to continue to volunteer in the Pediatric Research Lab at the U of R where top researchers are looking for a cure for childhood AIDS and other illnesses affecting children. Jessica also has a part-time job working at Kidtown in Midtown Athletic Club and puts as much effort into her volunteer job as the paying one. She cares deeply about the welfare and health of the community's children and contributes to that cause with dedication and compassion.

Emily was nominated by Wanda Acevedo, Director of Programs at Wilson Commencement Park. Of all the cases they received, they had little or no evidence and ONE witness, Keyanna Bolton. With support from her mom, Keyanna bravely participated in the investigation and as a result, the rash of crimes was stopped and the persons

responsible charged with their crimes. The Investigators who nominated Keyanna say that she is the "unsung heroine in her neighborhood" because without her help the crimes would have continued. Keyanna's teachers say she is polite and courteous and is always willing to help her classmates. Her bravery and cooperation is an example to her peers.



Cameron Irland 5th Grade Harris Hill Elementary School

Cameron was nominated by his Mom who is battling a life threatening disease. While this has been difficult, Cameron recognized that there are children his own age that fight the same fight and he wanted to do something nice for these children for Christmas. So he called on his hockey team, his grandma's kindergarten class in Canton, NY, his family

members, and his neighborhood and school friends to chip in and help. Cameron coordinated their efforts and was able to collect a truckload of gifts for the children at Golisano's Children's Hospital. Cameron's empathy and drive to do something good for someone else at such an early age makes him a role model for his peers. It seems Cameron already knows what it takes some of us a lifetime to learn: the surest way to feel good from the inside out is to put a smile on someone else's face through kindness of word or action.

35 stitches to his face. He clearly put the safety of his little brother before his own. His teacher describes Jacob as a kind and helpful hard- worker, who puts a lot of pride into his schoolwork and enjoys a challenge.



Miya Davis 4th Grade Henry W. Longfellow School #36

On a cold day in February, an attempt to make a home repair went horribly wrong for Miya's mom. Her clothing caught fire while she was attempting to ignite the pilot light on their furnace. During the incident, Miya kept a cool head and was able to physically help her Mom extinguish the flames on

her body and remove her burning clothes. Miya, who at 10 years old is the oldest of 4 children, called 911 and was able to calmly relay the situation to the dispatchers as well as give her Mom's full name, date of birth, age, address, and phone number. Miya continues to try to improve at school and is on the school Step team. Miya's Mom feels that Miya saved her life and is very proud of her brave and courageous actions that day.



Mustafa Said 10th Grade Christopher Patino 11th Grade Rush-Henrietta Senior High School

On January 25th, a young woman and young man were having an argument in a Henrietta Wegmans Supermarket. The argument suddenly turned violent when the young man produced a knife and stabbed the young woman. Christopher and Mustafa saw this and physically intervened, stopping the young man from assaulting the young woman further. Although, it is not the recommendation of law enforcement

to physically intervene in an altercation and risk injury to yourself that does not subtract from the fact that these two young men reacted courageously and selflessly to help a stranger and prevent her from further harm. For that reason, their actions are commendable.

Nathalie's mom passed away last year, dramatically affecting her entire family. Nathalie confided in Officer Brown regarding a family member who had become volatile and reckless in an attempt to deal with the loss of Nathalie's mom. Nathalie knew

the family member would be angry with her for telling anyone outside of the family about what they were going through, but her love and concern for the family member outweighed her fear of them being angry with her. Officer Brown intervened and the family member was hospitalized and able to receive counseling for their grief and substance abuse issues. This is the role model behavior that we encourage in our young adults.



Jacob –Thomas Darrel Meyering 8th Grade Bioscience and Health Careers High School @ Franklin

School Resource Officer Ebony Brown, nominated Jacob-Thomas for a similarly courageous, but very different, incident. Jacob-Thomas found a pocket knife at the entrance of his school, which has had problems daily with students concealing/leaving weapons around the outside of the building to be retrieved after-school. Without anyone asking him to, Jacob-Thomas

turned the knife in to Officer Brown and showed her where he found it. Jacob-Thomas could have made a different choice, but he made the choice to help keep everyone safe and to not keep something that did not belong to him. Jacob's teachers say that he is very respectful of adults and is a member of the Recycling Club at school.



Courtney Crews 8th Grade School of the Arts

In December of last year, a structure fire was intentionally set on the Northwest side of the city with no regard for the safety of our Firefighters or the neighborhood. The fire displaced four families, caused thousands of dollars in property damage and cost the City of Rochester thousands of dollars to extinguish and investigate. The observations and cooperation of

Courtney Crews proved to be invaluable to this investigation, which ultimately resulted in an adult being charged with Arson. The Rochester Fire Department Arson Task force who nominated her were very impressed with 14 year old Courtney's maturity and willingness to help and said that "she is a role model for others in the community".



Kiel Briggs 3rd Grade Helen Barrett Montgomery School #50

Very recently, someone stole property from an apartment in Kiel's apartment building. Officers arrived on the scene and were told that the suspect had run away from the property. As Officers prepared to canvas the neighborhood, unsolicited information received from Kiel not only led to the thief being located in the building's basement, but also resulted in the recovery of over \$250 that had been stolen from another Rochester City School District student who had collected the money as a fundraising campaign to benefit their school. Kiel's teachers say that he is well-mannered and motivated. Kiel's actions are admirable and his willingness to come forward immediately helped another student.


