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About Our Program

The Do The Right Thing Award Program has been part of the Rochester Police Department since 1995. The goal of the program is to foster positive relationships between local area law enforcement and the youth within Monroe County. The Do The Right Thing Award Program recognizes children for their positive behavior, accomplishments, and good deeds by rewarding students who strive to make good choices, do well in school, give back to their communities, or demonstrate "turn-around" or improved behavior.



Any student enrolled in grades Kindergarten - 12 in any school within Monroe County is eligible for nomination, and can be nominated for acts of courage and bravery, such as assisting first responders, as well as acts of volunteerism, leadership and role model behavior. Students may be nominated for incidents that have occurred within one year of the nomination, and within Monroe County.

Anyone over 18 years old can nominate a student (this includes first responders, teachers, coaches, family, friends, etc.). Nominations are accepted throughout the year, and are reviewed by a committee that selects students to receive the Do The Right Thing Award. Selected students are celebrated at a ceremony at the City Public Safety Building. Ceremonies are held during the school year, with approximately ten students recognized at each ceremony. Family and friends are welcome to attend these ceremonies, unless the ceremony is held virtually due to safety concerns (such as during the COVID pandemic). If this is the case, attendance would be limited, but everyone would be welcome to watch the ceremony as it takes place, or anytime afterwards, by watching via Facebook Live on our Facebook page. Regardless, all ceremonies, whether in-person or virtual, will be recorded and shared on Facebook, so you'll never have to worry about missing a ceremony, and you can always go back and watch past recorded ceremonies as many times as you'd like!

Do The Right Thing Award winners are eligible to receive several rewards and prizes donated by program sponsors, and winners may also apply for a college or trade school scholarship when they are high school seniors. Since the program began, we have received over 4,000 nominations, awarded over 1,100 winners, and contributed over \$100,000 towards scholarships for our winners. Students selected as winners must attend an award ceremony in order to officially be considered a Do The Right Thing Winner, unless the ceremony is held virtually. All students that are nominated will receive a letter of recognition for their act, even if they are not chosen as a winner.

In May Nicholas was riding his scooter alone in his neighborhood when he was followed and approached by a stranger in a vehicle who attempted to engage Nicholas in inappropriate conversation. Nicholas was uncomfortable and sensed danger, so he immediately went home and reported what happened to his parents. On his way home he even told the nearby neighbor to be safe. His parents called 911 and the Monroe County Sheriff's Office responded to investigate. Nicholas was brave and provided the deputies very detailed information about the man and the car he was driving. Nicholas did the right thing by going to a safe location and immediately telling an adult, and reacted courageously when he spoke to law enforcement and provided them very important information. His actions serve as a model for children of what to do if they are ever in a similar situation, and hopefully his bravery and willingness to speak up will encourage others to do the same. A few weeks after the ceremony, Program Coordinator Laurie Kingsley-Henry, accompanied by Rochester Police Recruitment Officers Morales & Calderon, visited Kamden's class at Urban Choice Charter School. Together they gave a brief presentation about the Do The Right Thing Award Program and what Kamden did to receive his award, talked briefly about safety in their homes, and handed out pencils, brochures, calendars, treats and Junior Police Badges. The children were very well behaved and enjoyed the visit, and thanked their visitors with big hugs!



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Ryker was nominated by 911 telecommunicators Rachel DiVirgilio & Roxanne Angst for the way he responded during an emergency situation that occurred this summer. On August 14th Ryker called 911 to report his neighbor's lawn was on fire. He provided very detailed descriptions and updates, such as how rapidly the fire was spreading and how close the fire was getting to the neighbor's house. He answered all the questions that were asked of him to the best of his ability, and provided crucial information which helped the fire department respond as guickly and efficiently as possible. While he did not know the exact address of his neighbor's house, he gave very specific details of what the house looked like, which helped the telecommunicators pinpoint the exact location. During the entire conversation, the 911 telecommunicators noted Ryker was always very helpful and polite. Mr. Lane, the principal at Ryker's school, says that Ryker is a kind, conscientious and thoughtful young man, and an absolute role model for his 🖈 peers. Great job Ryker!

Preparing for 2023 Scholarship Applications
