CDBG-R SUBSTANTIAL AMENDMENT NO. TWO (#2)

The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 ("Recovery Act") was signed into law by President Obama on February 17, 2009. The Recovery Act awards \$1 billion in CDBG Recovery (CDBG-R) funds to be distributed to cities, counties, insular areas and states, of which \$10 million has been reserved by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for its administrative costs and \$10 million of which will be awarded to Indian tribes. Recipients of the remaining \$980 million of CDBG-R funds will be the approximately 1,200 jurisdictions that received CDBG funding in Fiscal Year 2008.

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Ensuring Responsible Spending of Recovery Act Funds

Funding available under the Recovery Act has clear purposes-to stimulate the economy through measures that modernize the Nation's infrastructure, improve energy efficiency, and expand educational opportunities and access to health care. HUD strongly urges grantees to use CDBG-R funds for hard development costs associated with infrastructure activities that provide basic services to residents or activities that promote energy efficiency and conservation through rehabilitation or retrofitting of existing buildings. While the full range of CDBG activities is available to grantees, HUD strongly suggests that grantees incorporate consideration of the public perception of the intent of the Recovery Act in identifying and selecting projects for CDBG-R funding.

- Investing in transportation, environmental protection, or other infrastructure that will provide long-term economic benefits;
- Minimizing or avoiding reductions in essential services; or
- Fostering energy independence.

The Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program enables local governments to undertake a wide range of activities intended to create suitable living environments and provide decent affordable housing and create economic opportunities primarily for persons of low and moderate income.

On February 17, 2009, the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (Recovery Act) (Public Law 111-5) was signed into law. The Act provides \$2,585,159 in supplemental CDBG funds to the City of Rochester for housing and community development activities.

Under the Recovery Act, the City of Rochester will give priority to projects and activities that can award contracts within 120 days from the date the funds are made available to the recipients. The projects chosen are poised for rapid implementation and have an accelerated implementation schedule. The City of Rochester is investing funds in economic development activities with the goal quickly spur economic investment and job creation and retention. For infrastructure projects, there is a goal of at least 50% of the funds for activities that can be initiated not later than 120 days after the date of enactment of this act.

To receive the funding, the City of Rochester prepared a substantial amendment to the 2008-09 Consolidated Community Development Plan / Annual Action Plan and submitted it to HUD on May 29, 2009. The substantial amendment gave the public an opportunity to comment on the proposed use of the supplemental CDBG funding. The substantial amendment also served as the application for the funding. The City of Rochester is proposing a second substantial amendment to the 2008-09 Consolidated Community Development Plan / Annual Action Plan whereby \$686,000 will be transferred from the EDD Financial Assistance Loan and Grant Program account within the Promoting Economic Stability Objective to the Neighborhood Right-of-Way Improvements account within the General Community Needs Objective (a portion of the \$2,585,159 received from HUD under the Recovery Act).

The City of Rochester will give the public an opportunity to comment on the proposed substantial amendment. The hearing will be held on the proposed transfer. According to CDBG-R guidance from HUD dated June 22, 2012, subsequent amendments to the CDBG-R substantial amendment do not require HUD approval.

Following is a summary:

EDD Financial Assistance Loan & Grant Program (reduced from \$2,585,189 to \$1,899,189): Two projects are being funded from the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act supplemental CDBG allocation through the Main Street Assistance Program. Each project is described in the first substantial amendment.

Neighborhood Right-of-Way Improvements (\$686,000): These activities include, but are not limited to, pavement improvements (micropaving and milling and resurfacing), curbing, tree lawns, catch basins, traffic calming features, and sidewalk repair/replacement will be made in CDBG eligible locations.

None of the funds will be used for administration and planning.

None of the funds will be used for public services.

At least 70% of the grant amount will benefit persons of low and moderate income.
