Urban Agriculture Working Group Community Garden Grant Program

With support from the Rochester Area Community Foundation (RACF) and the City of Rochester, the Urban Agriculture Working Group (UAWG) is excited to offer a funding opportunity to Rochester's community gardens. The purpose of this grant opportunity is to assist community garden groups in purchasing tools and materials for their community gardens. This program is open to any community garden group within the City of Rochester that has successfully maintained a community garden for at least 2 growing seasons.

The UAWG will be awarding six to eight, \$250-\$500 grants. These grants will be awarded in the form of a purchasing credit with the City of Rochester's Department of Recreation and Youth Services. If your community garden is selected to receive a grant, you will work with a DRYS representative to order supplies and materials for your garden. Grant money can be utilized to purchase the following types of items: topsoil, perennial plant material, vegetable seedlings, annual plants, tools/equipment, lumber for raised beds, and other supplies that benefit your community garden.

Beyond simply providing financial support to gardens, the Urban Agriculture Working Group's intention in offering this grant opportunity includes a desire to:

- Nurture The Grant Seeking Capacity Among Community Gardens. We know that finding and applying for money can be confusing and intimidating. If you've never applied for a grant before, we hope that this process helps you develop the skills and confidence necessary to go out and pursue other funding opportunities. We are here to help you through the process- so PLEASE don't hesitate to get in touch if you have any questions related to the application process.
- Build A Strong Community Garden Movement in Rochester. Community gardening is growing in Rochester, and the Urban Agriculture Working Group is dedicated to supporting and strengthening new and existing community garden leaders in the City of Rochester. Gardens that receive a grant through this process are required to have a representative from your garden join the Urban Agriculture Working Group. Participation in the UAWG can include: attending monthly meetings, helping with future events, working on research, and/or vetting future applications for funding.

HOW TO APPLY:

The application process is easy! Please complete the questions below and include a photo of your garden (**TIP**: funders, not just us, LOVE to see pictures of people working in community gardens!). Decisions about grant awards will be made and notifications will be sent to community garden groups by May 25, 2016.

- 6. How would receiving a grant through the UAWG help your garden grow and/or improve, as well as address the challenges and opportunities you listed above? (TIP: This is often called the "return on investment.")
- 7. We will require an end of the season report from gardens that receive funding. How will you demonstrate and document success? (For example: Before and after photos, increased sign-ups, event attendance, etc.) (**TIP**: Save all your documentation! It will really help you apply for other grants!)
- 8. If selected for a grant, who will your garden send to participate in UAWG meetings and activities? If different from the contact listed above, please include their information. This commitment may be shared among multiple people, but we'd prefer one or two to take the lead on it.
