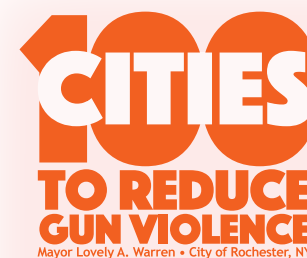

Gun violence victimizes families, public safety officers and neighborhoods and our citizens are in the trenches. As we continue into the summer months, I urge you to have a conversation about gun violence and help us take back our community and effect change.

In June, Rochester joined the national observation of Gun Violence Awareness Week and in Rochester, we extended that week to a month, creating events and opportunities to bring much-needed attention to this important issue. We kicked off our first Clergy on Patrol for the season on North Clinton Avenue and we supported our local partners engaged in anti-violence efforts.

Rochester Sets Sail With Port of Rochester Marina Grand Opening



Just in time for summer, the Port of Rochester Marina is now open for boaters and everyone to enjoy after two-and-a-half years of construction. The idea to build a marina at this site was first proposed more than 50 years ago and, with the help of our partners at the state and federal levels, we have finally made it a reality.

The state-of-the-art marina offers 54 seasonal boat slips and 30 transient slips with modern amenities including potable water, electricity, wi-fi and pump-out facilities. Visitors can enjoy the new public promenade, benches, picnic tables, barbeque

grills and park areas that surround the marina and connect to the Charlotte Pier and the Genesee River Trail System.

Renovations of the Port of Rochester Terminal Link Building will be completed this summer to create a new boater services facility which will include showers, rest-rooms, a laundry, a boaters lounge and small ship store. The new construction at the terminal is expected to lure more cruise ships to the Port within the next few years.

In addition to the thriving businesses at the Port, two new restaurants are opening this summer: The Jetty at the Port, a casual

restaurant with a Great Lakes nautical theme; and Mom's Margio's Diner with a 1950s retro theme.

Upon final completion, the Port and its additions are expected to provide a significant stimulus to the Rochester economy.

Our beautiful new Marina puts our city on the map of Great Lakes destinations and establishes a true Port of Opportunity at the meeting place of the Genesee River and Lake Ontario.

Police Body Worn Cameras Roll Out

Body-worn cameras will help further our goal of bringing true community policing to our city and build on the already strong relationship between our police department and the community it serves. Starting this summer, the Rochester Police Department will implement the Body-Worn Camera Program, one section at a time, starting in the Clinton Section.

The proposed implementation schedule is as follows: Central Section, Goodman Section, Lake Section, Genesee Section and Special Operations Section. RPD expects all sections to be trained by early 2017.

Improving police-community relations is a top priority and to ensure success, RPD is working with critical departments within the City including IT, Budget and Law. External partnerships with the District Attorney's Office, Public Defender and Civilian Review Board are also key partners in the program. Most significantly, it includes a strong partnership with the community, including you.

Make a Difference in Your Neighborhood

Increasing safety in neighborhoods is not just the role of law enforcement, it also involves citizens who feel empowered to work with the police in crime prevention.

Police and Citizens Together Against Crime (PAC-TAC) pairs volunteers with on-duty patrol officers to walk in neighborhoods and interact with citizens and local merchants to help prevent crime.

All volunteers receive extensive training and are issued distinctive clothing, a flashlight and a portable digital radio to contact the police directly. If you spot criminal activity, or are in need of assistance, you summon an officer via radio.

Mayor's Summer Stars - Summer Learning Challenge



Whether kids prefer to experience an adventure through books or they thrive in hands-on activities, I challenge kids to stem the summer "brain drain" and have some fun by taking advantage of the free programs City libraries and R-Centers have to offer.

The Mayor's Summer Stars - Summer Learning Challenge consists of four educational programs offered at City Libraries and R-Centers:

R-Center Magnet Day Programs: Several City R-Centers are offering free, specialized

"magnet" day programs which feature activities focused on areas of interest such as science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM), sports, the arts and the environment. In these programs, kids "learn by doing" through investigation, experimentation and problem solving. Magnet

programs also includes field trips related to the program theme.

City Library Programs: City Branch Libraries offer a wide variety of arts, literature and fitness programs all summer long. From fencing to campfire stories, City Libraries provide activities to suit every interest.

Drop Everything and Read: Summer is an excellent time to start a new adventure in reading.



To encourage kids to continue reading during the summer, the Mayor is challenging kids to "drop everything and read" 10 or more books this summer. Participants will receive an official "Mayoral Excellence in Reading Certificate" and coupon for a free book from the library.

Lovely and Taylor's Book Club: I'm excited to share with you that we've launched "Lovely and Taylor's Book Club". Throughout the summer, me and my daughter, Taylor, age 5, will share our favorite books with the community through displays at libraries and on social media.
