

City of Rochester Public Market: Renovation Updates



Great news! In April, we will break ground on the City of Rochester Public Market's exciting \$8 million renovation and addition project. We can look forward to a new, outdoor covered shed—essentially a replica of the historic original (c.1904) that was demolished in 1963. There will be 50 more vending spaces allowing for more local growers and producers to offer their wares.



In addition, a new state-of-the-art brick and glass enclosed shed will be built in place of the existing one and the free standing food stands will be rebuilt in custom designed, repurposed shipping containers. These improvements will enhance the wonderful Market experience for both vendors and customers.

Very special care is being taken to ensure that these improvements further enrich the Market's character and functionality.

Free Compost, Wood Chips and Chipstone Help Keep your Yard Clean and Green

As the snow melts and your grass and gardens come back to life, be sure to take advantage of Rochester's Materials Give Back Program. This is our way of providing various "green" recycled materials to residents free-of-charge to use for household landscaping or other improvement projects.

The leaves the City collects are treated and offered to the public as compost. Holiday trees from our collection sites are sent through a wood chipper and converted into mulch; a material perfect for flowerbeds or other landscaping projects.

Scrap wood and brush are ground to wood chips and chipstone from the City's chip seal program, buildable fill and scrap lumber pieces are also made available to the public.

The Materials Give Back Center is located at the Solid Waste Collection facility on Ferrano Street, near Colfax Street. The Center opens for the season on April 15.

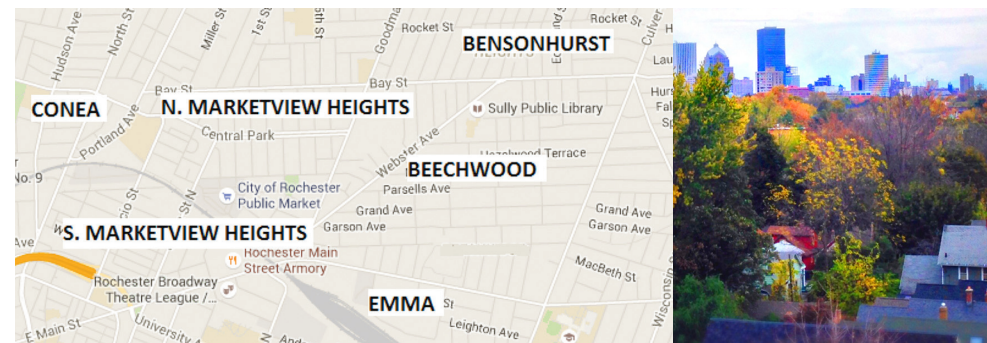


ISO Ranks Rochester as Class 1 City for Fire Protection

This February, I was proud to announce that the national Insurance Services Office Inc. (ISO) has ranked Rochester as a Class 1 city for fire protection. This ranking leads to lower insurance rates for homes and businesses. Rochester is just one of four Class 1 cities in New York State. This independent evaluation assures citizens and business owners that we are not only making them as safe from fire as we possibly can, but we're also doing everything we can to keep insurance rates as low as possible. Our decision to re-establish a true Community Outreach Unit, with Firefighters dedicated full-time to fire prevention and safety, also played a major role in the grade.



Neighborhood-Focused Partnership to Spark Renewal



Working together, community and government leaders will bring services and resources into three key neighborhoods that meet the individual needs of the residents, with a goal to lift communities out of poverty. The Marketview Heights, Beechwood and EMMA neighborhoods will be the initial focus of the City of Rochester Innovation Team, Rochester-Monroe Anti-Poverty Initiative (RMAPI) and Connected Communities efforts.

Services will focus around four areas: Cradle to Career Education; Community Wellness; Mixed Income Housing and Economic Viability, and could include adult mentoring, job training, more access

to mixed-income housing and increased access to childcare and transportation. The initiatives will build on the Urban Village concept that was first outlined in the IBM Smarter Cities Challenge report, and RMAPI's Principle of "Community Building." The focus will be utilizing the work done by the Mayor's Office of Innovation and Strategic Initiatives to find a target area to begin implementing strategies to lift people out of poverty.

It was a great thrill and honor to unveil a long-lost photo of Frederick Douglass to a packed atrium of City Hall in February.

The newly discovered image of the famed abolitionist, human rights advocate,



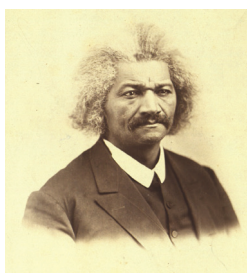
writer, orator, advisor to President Lincoln and distinguished statesman was found last year in the Special Collections of the Rochester Public Library.

The photograph is estimated to have been taken in 1883 and has an interesting story that will be told in a new documentary titled "Rediscovering Frederick Douglass." The documentary will explore the life of the photo's owner, the mystery surrounding the image and the powerful way that Frederick Douglass used photography for social change.
