



BOA = Brownfield Opportunity Area

- supports community revitalization

City establishes a Project Advisory Committee and hires Bergmann Associates to facilitate the planning process

April 9, 2015: BOA Designation

The Vacuum Oil BOA was in the first group of 12 BOA's to be officially designated by New York State.

"By designating these sites as brownfield opportunity areas, we are helping to reimagine their potential as vibrant parts of the surrounding communities. This distinction allows us to put their rehabilitation on the fast-track with additional state resources, and that means new development, jobs and opportunities in the future. This is another way that our administration is joining with local partners to revitalize blighted areas across the state."



Transportation Analysis: Summary of Key Findings and Alternatives Identified to Date





Traffic Analysis

- PURPOSE: Understand existing traffic volumes and potential impacts to road network with implementation of the Vision Plan
- Collected existing traffic data information and intersection counts
- Obtained Synchro traffic models from MCDOT
- Developed traffic analysis models for existing conditions
- Prepared trip generation estimates for each of the three master plan phases

Vision Plan Buildout Conditions




Traffic Analysis Key Findings

- Restrict On-Street Parking on local roads from Magnolia to Violetta
- Improvements to Ford / Exchange Street Intersection
- Incorporate Pedestrian and Bicycle Amenities
- Traffic Calming, Intersection and Streetscape Enhancements – Exchange, Flint and Plymouth Avenue

Flint Street Improvements

- City completed environmental investigations and geotechnical studies in 2015
- Design of Flint Street improvements funded in the 2017 Capital Improvement Program
- Construction funding
 allocated for 2018


